Dear Friends and Neighbors —

It is with a very heavy heart that we present this newsletter following the tragedy that occurred recently in Mānoa Valley. While we will never make sense of why it happened, our deep condolences go out to those who knew the victims, especially the 3 precious children whose lives ended too soon.

Here at the Legislature, we passed the halfway point with First Crossover behind us (where House bills "cross over" to the Senate and vice versa). About 800 bills are alive at this point.

Five bills that I introduced made it to this major milestone, including HB2664, which redirects nearly \$400 million previously set aside for the New Aloha Stadium Entertainment District to assist with the Maui recovery. Everything must be on the table as we balance our state budget with support for wildfire survivors expected to cost over \$1 billion in this fiscal year alone. I take my fiduciary duty to look out for the best interests of taxpayers seriously, even if it results in a target on my back.

Our next district newsletter will be issued after we adjourn on May 3rd, so please continue to contact us with your thoughts on any of the bills before us. No matter how busy I am, I will always personally reply to your questions and inquiries.

Notable Bills Still Alive at the 2024 Legislature

Here are highlights of some bills of interest as of mid-March (when this newsletter went to print). For a complete listing, please visit the Hawaii Legislature's website at www.capitol.hawaii.gov.

HB2664 HD1 Relating to Sports Facilities

Description: Lapses appropriations of \$350 million in bond funds previously authorized for a new stadium in Hālawa. Moves \$49.5 million in special fund moneys earmarked for the new stadium in Hālawa to the general fund. Authorizes bonds for a permanent stadium on the University of Hawai'i at Manoa campus.

My position: SUPPORT

Rationale: The devastation brought on by the Maui wildfire compels us to make hard decisions regarding the state budget. Taxpayer support for the survivors is expected to cost nearly \$1 billion this year, and funding for all "nice to have" projects like the New Aloha Stadium Entertainment District (NASED) must be reevaluated. It is not sound fiscal policy to proceed with the NASED project simply because we have already spent \$25 million on planning alone.

In addition to the hundreds of millions we'll save by pausing the project, now is an opportune time to reassess what is the highest and best use of this 100 acre site that comes with a fully built rail station. If we are serious about building affordable and workforce housing for our residents, the NASED site holds the potential to bring several thousand units to the market in one fell swoop. This bill is the last chance to have this important discussion.

SB3335 SD1 Relating to Cannabis

Description: Beginning January 1, 2026, legalizes the personal adult use of cannabis. Establishes taxes for cannabis sales.

My position: OPPOSE

Rationale: The protection of public health and safety must be at the forefront of every decision we make at the legislature. I have strong concerns about the potential impact and unintended costs of this bill, particularly for Hawai'i's youth. Research suggests that cannabis impairs brain development in teens and adults under age 25, and is linked to lower educational attainment, increased anxiety, depression and mental health issues.

SB2381 SD2 Relating to Public Financing for **Candidates for Elective Office**

Description: Establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for candidates seeking election to state and county public offices to begin with the 2028 general election year.

My position: SUPPORT

Rationale: Fundraising is the part of being a legislator I dislike the most. Passage of SB2381 would help break the link between special interest money and politics. However, there are some who are uncomfortable with their taxpayer dollars going to candidates they do not agree with. It is thought such a system could cost up to \$30 million per election cycle.

HB1630 HD1 Relating to Urban Development

Description: Permits county zoning ordinances to allow 2 or more additional dwelling units per lot.

My position: OPPOSE

Rationale: Established communities within urban Honolulu do not have sufficient infrastructure in place to support up to 3 homes on each residential lot. While we agree on the need for more housing, this bill will likely irreparably change the character of our community.

New housing development planned at former campus

Saint Francis Acquired by **Avalon Development**

In early February, Avalon Development closed on the sale of the former St. Francis school campus for nearly \$24 million. Under current zoning laws, Avalon could build about sixty residences (each with a minimum lot size of 7,500 sq. feet), but the developer has not confirmed its plans for this site.

In a subsequent interview with KHON2 News, I encouraged the developer to immediately engage with the community to share their plans for this 11acre site. The neighbors along Pāmoa Road and Hipawai Place are rightfully concerned about traffic and other impacts. I was informed Avalon reached out to the Mānoa Neighborhood Board to request time on a future agenda for a presentation, but nothing has been confirmed as of March.

Kamehameha Schools to Renovate Waiānuenue

Kamehameha Schools, owner of the parcels around the old Varsity Theater at the corner of University Avenue and South King Street, have announced plans to renovate their lowrise retail complex across from Puck's Alley.

Tenants will begin moving out in May 2024 and construction will begin in July 2024 and take 12 months. The Grand Opening of Waiānuenue at Kapa'akea is anticipated to occur in the spring of 2026.
