We are fast approaching the midway point of the 2023 Legislative session with First Crossover set for March 9, 2023. This deadline marks a significant point in which bills must be passed by the third reading to continue moving to the other chamber. If successful, House bills will be sent to the Senate, and Senate bills are sent to the House to continue through session.




LEGISLATURE AT HALWAY POINT:

BILLS THAT ARE GAINING MOMENTUM

Typically, only 25 percent of bills introduced survive the First Crossover deadline. Bills that crossover will be heard in the non-originating chamber to review. There are still opportunities to testify on bills that are important to you and to make amendments to bills that continue to move through session. In addition to the bills, I mentioned in the Q&A segment, below are some measures we are closely monitoring that support our community in a variety of ways.

HB491 HD1: RELATING TO A LEAVE GRANT **PROGRAM**





Increases the state earned income tax credit from twenty to twenty-five percent of the federal earned income tax credit.

HB493 HD1: RELATING TO TAXATION

Amends the income brackets and credit amounts of the refundable food/excise tax credit.

HB494: RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES

Subjects to the rights, responsibilities, and liabilities of transferees under section 286-52, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, organizations that receive motor vehicles as charitable donations.

HB495: RELATING TO FIREWORKS

Increases fines that may be assessed against certain fireworks-related violations.

HB1341: RELATING TO MEDICAID

Appropriates moneys for the achievement of full funding, including estimated payment of increases, Medicaid Homeand Community-Based Services.














Keeping Up With It All-Session's in Full Swing

Asking for a Hearing

The chair of the committee to which a bill is referred has the authority to schedule a hearing for that said bill. The lateral and first decking deadlines approach quickly, so monitor your bills and get in touch with the appropriate chair's office to request a bill be heard.

Finding committee information and contacting them is easy. Go to the capitol website (capitol.hawaii.gov) and give them a call or send an email. Have a few sentences with your request ready. If the legislator is not available, speak with the office manager or the committee clerk.

Be aware that the chair has a number of things to consider when scheduling a bill, including committee referrals, pertinent deadlines and timelines to hold hearings, competing legislation, and merits and implications of the bill. If you're having an issue getting your bill heard, consider asking others to advocate, too! You can also reach out to other members of the committee to request if they are willing to convince the chair that the bill deserves to be heard.






