Department's Position:

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) supports SB 2072, which requests changing from a weekly Department report on school coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) to reporting potential outbreaks or other public health emergencies and related information in a manner most appropriate to public health and safety, as determined by the Hawaii State Department of Health (DOH).

Prior to the 2023-2024 school year (SY), results from COVID-19 tests administered on school campuses were used to populate the weekly COVID-19 reports. Beginning this SY, testing on school campuses is not routinely conducted. The weekly COVID-19 report is now populated by data reported to schools by parents/legal guardians versus actual test results, making the weekly COVID-19 report an administrative burden with minimal impact.

With the removal of the weekly COVID-19 reporting requirement, the Department will continue to follow the procedure for reporting potential outbreaks of COVID-19, influenza-like illnesses, gastrointestinal illnesses, or other public health emergencies

determined by the DOH. The Department has a long history of collaboration with the DOH on reporting, responding to, and notifying school communities of potential outbreaks of communicable diseases at schools and is committed to continuing this ongoing collaboration to ensure public health and safety.

Chair Kidani and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments.

The bill authorizes the Department of Health (DOH) to require the Department of Education (DOE) to report coronavirus disease 2019 potential outbreaks or other public health emergencies and related information in a manner most appropriate to public health and safety, as determined by DOH. The bill also repeals the requirement to publish weekly reports on the DOE's website.

Under this bill, there is a theoretical potential for the DOE to be asked to provide "personally identifiable information" as defined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). See 20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 C.F.R. § 99.3. Pursuant to FERPA, the DOE must determine whether there is a health or safety emergency that warrants the release of personally identifiable information before it can provide the information. To avoid any potential FERPA violations, the Department recommends adding the following wording after page 1, line 17, of the bill: "The department of health may not require the department of education to include in any report personally identifiable information or education records, as provided in title 20 United States Code section 1236g and title 34 Code of Federal Regulations section 99.3; provided that the department of education may provide personally identifiable information only after it has determined that a health or safety emergency exists."
