SB 2817 SD2 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII COLLEGE OF TROPICAL AGRICULTURE AND HUMAN RESOURCES

Chair Perruso, Vice Chair Kapela, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on SB 2817 SD2 relating to the University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture Human Resources (CTAHR) which make an appropriation to the University of Hawai'i to establish five full-time equivalent (5.0 APT FTE) faculty positions at CTAHR.

CTAHR <u>strongly supports</u> this bill and, we respectfully offer one suggested amendment. Specifically, this bill aims to help rectify significant gaps in the reach of Cooperative Extension programs due to vacancies that have surfaced in the past four years. We suggest the following amendment to SECTION 3 which designates one full-time equivalent extension agent in water quality and conservation in the county of Maui.

Specifically, this bill will provide:

SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the CTAHR at the University of Hawaii at Manoa to establish five full-time equivalent (5.0 FTE) positions; provided that the sums appropriated shall be expended as follows:

- (1) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) extension specialist in water quality and conservation in the county of Maui; <u>SUGGESTED ADMENDMENT:</u>
 - \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) <u>extension agent</u> in water quality and conservation in the county of Maui;
- (2) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) extension agent in livestock in Hilo, county of Hawaii;
- (3) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) state extension specialist in livestock at the university of Hawaii at Manoa;

- (4) \$ for one full-time equivalent agent in urban horticulture and food systems in the city and county of Honolulu; and
- (5) \$ for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) extension agent in health and community development in the county of Maui.

The sum appropriate shall be expended by the university of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.

CTAHR's Cooperative Extension relies on the knowledge and experience of county extension agents and extension specialists to extend research-based knowledge from the land-grant university out to the residents and agricultural producers of the state. That capability has been severely hampered by a string of resignations and retirements happening just prior to, and during, the COVID-19 pandemic. Agricultural producers from around the state have expressed how essential these noted positions are for the health and well-being of Hawaii's agricultural producers and consumers.

We strongly support SB 2817 SD2 with the suggested amendment, provided its adoption does not impact priorities as indicated in our Board of Regents Approved Budget. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on the measure.

Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai i Farm Bureau supports SB 2817, SD2, which makes an appropriation to the University of Hawaii to establish five full-time equivalent (5.0 FTE) faculty positions at the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources.

The excellent work performed by UH CTAHR for Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers cannot be overstated. The ongoing outreach and education are unparalleled in the State. Farmers and ranchers rely on this program for their success. CTAHR has helped develop and improve agricultural technologies pertinent to Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers. This includes intensive cover crop research, promoting the importance of locally grown produce, developing biological and cultural methods for controlling pests without chemicals, and the use of biological nitrogen fixation to significantly increase the production of high protein foods while at the same time reducing the need for commercially produced fertilizers.
