

Mission

Land Division is responsible for managing State-owned lands in ways that will promote the social, environmental and economic well-being of Hawaii's people and for ensuring that these lands are used in accordance with the goals, policies and plans of the State.

Accomplishments in FY24 and FY25:

- Above-ground demolition of Uncle Billy's completed (contract management by Engineering Division) and appropriation secured for subsurface demolition and abatement
- BLNR approved transfer of 40 agriculture / pasture leases and revocable permits to DOA
- Administration measures for direct leasing and lease inspections became law (Acts 114 and 220, SLH 2024)
- Updated terms of State general lease forms with Department of the Attorney General





LNR 111: BUREAU OF CONVEYANCES (BOC)

- As part of the FY24 ceiling, \$1.2M was successfully encumbered for support services to continue reduction of the long-standing Land Court Certification backlog. As a result, the backlog has been reduced by 3 years.
- For FY26 BOC will continue to build out its automation infrastructure to support staff, consumers, business and government by delivering more effective, user-friendly tools and services like the “BOC Information Hub.” Preliminary discussion to statutorily address long standing issues related to Land Court System

LNR 404: Commission on Water Resource Management

Mission: To protect the water resources of the State of Hawai'i while maximizing reasonable and beneficial uses of water for present and future generations.

Three Branches

Achievements

- Obtained approval to enter a Joint Funding Agreement with USGS for FY25, providing high-quality data from 44 streamflow stations, 6 groundwater stations, and 17 rainfall stations
- Progress towards securing a site for a deep monitor well in Pā'ia aquifer, Maui
- Finalizing updates to the Hawaii Water Plan Framework
- With assistance from DAR, completed approximately 90 biological surveys of stream life statewide

LNR 404: Commission on Water Resource Management

 - FY26 \$200K/FY27 \$200K - Sustainable Yield Investigations. Will incorporate 2023 USGS data into a model to more accurately reflect climate impacts on groundwater recharge and availability, with priority for aquifers in Lahaina. Supports long-term planning and rebuilding efforts.
 - FY26 \$350K/FY27 \$350K - Hawai'i Mesonet Network. Funding to support network of telemetered climate stations in cooperation with UH Water Resources Research Center. The resulting data is utilized by CWRM, other agencies, and the scientific community for many purposes, including assessment of wildfire risk.

FY 2025 DOCARE Accomplishments:

- Over the span of seven months, the DOCARE Academy Program trained and developed twenty-five (25) new Conservation and Resources Enforcement Officers who were recently commissioned with police authority on December 13, 2024.
- The new Officers will effectively uphold the laws to protect, conserve and manage Hawai'i's unique and limited natural, cultural and limited resources on the islands of Hawai'i, Maui, Lana'i, O'ahu and Kaua'i.

\$700,000 CIP for Hilo Office Renovations to make necessary short-term repairs for the health and safety of staff and visitors at our existing Hilo office location and to identify a new permanent location that SHPD Hilo office staff, records, and archival materials can be moved to.

The existing Hilo office has repeatedly had issues with mold, termites, water leaks from the roof, and vagrants.

The Division of State Parks manages, regulates, and protects natural, scenic, and cultural resources for Hawai'i residents, visitors, and future generations

- Provide quality recreational, cultural, and educational experiences in a manner that minimizes public use conflicts and impact to resources.
- 34,000 acres, 53 park units and 13 other areas of responsibility ranging from remote wilderness areas with primitive facilities to iconic state monuments and recreational areas with landscaped grounds, parking, and comfort stations.
- The diversity of the State Park System is reflected in the titles - Historic Site, Historical Monuments, Recreation Areas and Piers, Waysides, Wilderness Areas, Scenic Shorelines, Reserves, and Parks.
- 155 positions, \$44 million operating budget in FY25
- No additional funds requested

Mo'okini Heiau, a National Historic Landmark located in the Kohala Historical Sites State Monument.

Initiatives completed in FY24:

- Sand Island SRA: Inventory of military historic properties in preparation for a \$5 million CIP that will include design for resiliency to sea level rise.
- Iolani Palace SM: \$1.2 million CIP for critically needed slate roof repairs
- Malaekahana SRA Kahuku Section: \$6.7 million CIP for improved camping and day use. Developing a request for proposals for a long-term lease that includes cabin construction and camping management






