I want to address the incident that occurred on Monday, February 22, 2021. You may have heard that I was arrested for suspicion of driving under the influence of an intoxicant that day. I want to apologize that you had to learn of this incident through the media, and to express my sincerest regrets to you for what happened. I also feel it is important for you all to know that I have been battling an upper respiratory illness for several weeks now. I was taking prescription medicine which contained codeine to control the symptoms associated with my illness. After working late that night, I did have a beer with dinner. While I did not realize it at the time, it is obvious that this decision, coupled with my medication and long work hours, is something I will regret for the rest of my life.

Many of you may or may not know that I have three full-time jobs: 1) as your dedicated District 42 representative; 2) as a full-time affordable housing developer; and 3) as a wife to my husband and mother to my 3-year old twin daughters. My commitment to our community has always been to put the Second City first. I deeply apologize to all of you, my family and friends, for this failure and for any embarrassment I have caused. I humbly ask you to see this as a learning experience for me. I am so thankful to the Honolulu Police Department for the professional manner in which they conducted their duties and, most importantly, that I did not injure anyone that evening.

Thank you for allowing me to share with you what happened on Feb. 22nd. I am far from perfect but remain fully committed to regaining your trust and confidence. It remains the greatest honor to serve as your voice in the House of Representatives. Thank you for giving me this privilege. COVID-19 Vaccination

On February 19, 2021, the Department of Health announced that COVID-19 vaccinations appointments will soon be open to people ages 70+, who are part of the vaccination roll-out plan for Phase 1c. Registration has not opened to all people in Phase 1c because there are still many kūpuna ages 75+, healthcare workers, and frontline essential workers in Phases 1a and 1b that are still awaiting the vaccine. Recent weather-related delays have impacted vaccination shipments and postponed previously scheduled appointments. The State anticipates receiving more than 50,000 backlogged vaccine doses for the week of February 22nd.

For those in Phases 1a and 1b, here is a listing of organizations that are accepting vaccination appointments:

O'AHU MOVES INTO TIER 3 OF THE COVID-19 REOPENING PLAN

On Tuesday, February 23rd, Gov. David Ige approved for the City and County of Honolulu to move to Tier 3 of its Covid -19 Recovery Plan. The change takes effect on Thursday, February 25, 2021. Here is a list of some of the changes:

- Restaurant groupings of 10 people are allowed regardless of household; restaurants move from 50% to 100% capacity
- Retail and Service businesses groupings up to 10 allowed; 50% capacity limit eliminated
- Social gatherings of up to 10 people allowed, up from five
- Gyms and fitness facilities can operate at 50% capacity, up from 25%
- Indoor group physical activity classes allowed with no more than 10 people, up from five
- Certain Real Estate operations allowed to operate with groups up to 10 people, up from five
- Funerals will be allowed to operate with up to 25 people, up from 10
- Commercial Recreational Boating allowed with 50% capacity, up from 25%
- Helicopter tours allowed with groups up to 10; capacity limit of 50% of legal occupancy eliminated

HAWAI'I FOODBANK NEEDS DONATIONS
