Informational Briefing: Status Update on Statewide Vote By Mail (VBM) Process

Senator Karl Rhoads, Chairperson Senator Glenn Wakai, Vice Chairperson Representative Chris Lee, Chair Representative Joy A. Buenaventura, Vice -Chair and Members of the Senate and House of Representatives Committee on Judiciary

Thank you for the opportunity to provide you with an update on the status of the County of Kauai's Vote By Mail (VBM) program for the 2020 Election Cycle. For the record, my name is Jade K. Fountain-Tanigawa, County Clerk. The County of Kauai has an estimated population of 72,133 people (2019 figures), of that number 44,461 are registered voters. In the 2018 General Election, we had a 58.1% voter turnout and have noticed a steady increase in number of people who have chosen to cast a ballot by mail (more commonly referred to as an Absentee Ballot) or have taken advantage of early voting services that we offer. Together, the total number of ballots cast in these two instances, exceed the number of people who have chosen to cast their ballot at the polls (2018 data: 14,420 vs 11,405). We are thankful that the Legislature supports our belief that this trend in voting will continue, and we are excited to embark on a Statewide Vote By Mail System.

Currently, we have procured the following items with funds appropriated through Act 182 ((2018 Session - Kaua'i vote by mail pilot project):

- One (1) Ballot scanner/sorter (\$59,850)
- Five (5) Steel Ballot cans (\$1,200)
- Four (4) Security cameras (\$6,523)

In total, we expended \$67,573 of the \$75,450 that was available. The County of Kauai is not eligible for funding appropriated through Act 136.

One area where we will be concentrating our efforts, will be on Voter Education. We feel that it is extremely important to inform voters of the transition to an All Mail Voting System, in order to ensure voter confidence. In addition, it is imperative that we address any questions that voters may have regarding the security of the system. To maximize our reach, we will be implementing various strategies. The first facet of this multi-tiered approach involves sending out several voter notification mailings in the time leading up to the 2020 Primary and General Elections.

- All-mail election notification postcards (orange card) were mailed in July 2019.
- Regular voter notification postcards (yellow card); date TBD.
- Voter signature update postcards; date TBD.
- Voter file maintenance mailings (white card); date TBD.

We will also be conducting voter outreach targeting seniors, new voters and business and neighborhood organizations. Our outreach program will begin in the first half of 2020 and will include:

- 1. The development of an All-Mail informational video; projected deployment in first half of 2020; currently seeking a vendor.
- 2. Print, radio, and television public service announcements will be coordinated statewide; topics and dates TBD.
- 3. Development of fact sheets and related Vote By Mail informational material will available in early 2020.
- 4. Social media engagement- Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter

We are also preparing for ballot envelopes and mailpiece assembly.

- 1. Negotiations with an in-state vendor is underway and is expected in include all envelopes needed for the 2020 Elections.
- 2. We are hopeful that negotiations are successful because:
 - We prefer to keep mail-piece assembly within the State; and
 - The prospective vendor has the experience and equipment to reduce the number of undeliverable mailpieces and prepare ballot mailings so that they qualify for the lowest possible postage rates.

As part of the Vote By Mail Program, and as required by ACT 136, we will be establishing a Voter Service Center as follows:

- 1. Location: Historic County Annex Basement 4386 Rice Street Līhu'e, Hawai'i 96766
- 2. Services will begin ten (10) days prior to each election and include:
 - In-person voting services via a paper or electronic ballot;
 - Late voter registration services;
 - Voter assistance to individuals with disabilities; and
 - Ballot place of deposit

3. The VSC will utilize electronic poll book provided by BPro Election Software, our voter registration system vendor.

Pursuant to ACT 136, we will also be establishing a place of deposit for ballots. These sites will begin accepting ballots five (5) days before the election and remain open until 7:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

. The Five sites that will be established will be in the following locations:

- North Kaua'i (Hā'ena to Kīlauea)
- East Kaua'i (Anahola to Wailua)
- Central Kaua'i (Hanamā'ulu to Kīpū)
- South Kaua'i (Koloa to Kalaheo)
- West Kauaʻi ('Ele'ele to Mānā)

Specific locations will be announced shortly.

Counting Center Operations will occur in Lihue and will involve ballot processing which will begin no sooner than ten (10) days before the election, however, the exact dates and times will be determined at a later date. All processing of ballots shall be completed in the presence of Official Observers.

Good afternoon, Chairs Rhoads and Lee, Vice Chairs Wakai and San Buenaventura, and Members of the Senate and House Judiciary Committees, thank you for the opportunity to provide comments.

My name is Sandy Ma. I am Executive Director of Common Cause Hawaii, a nonprofit, nonpartisan, grassroots organization dedicated to upholding the core values of American democracy. The foundation of American democracy is rooted upon a citizen's right to vote, which shall not be abridged or denied, according to the 15th Amendment of the US Constitution.

This exercise of our right to vote is modernized by the adoption of the Vote By Mail law. Common Cause Hawaii thanks the Senate and House Judiciary Committees, the Hawaii State Legislature as a whole, and Governor Ige for recognizing the need for modernizing our elections and voting systems. We also thank all the partners who supported this law – League of Women Voters, Americans for Democratic Action, Planned Parenthood Votes Northwest and Hawaii, the presenters here before you today, and numerous other organizations and individuals.

However, enactment of the Vote By Mail law is not enough. We need to ensure that implementation of Vote By Mail is done correctly so that no citizen's right to vote shall be abridged or denied. Proper implementation is key. For proper implementation there are a few factors:

- 1) There must be proper education of the public that Hawaii will be transitioning to all Vote By Mail.
 - In addition to proper education, there needs to broad and widespread education that Hawaii is transitioning to VBM.
 - We understand that of active voters in Hawaii in 2018, more voted absentee than at polling places. Still, we need to reach out and educate those who are accustomed to voting at traditional polling places.
 - We ask that State and Counties work with engaged stakeholders like Common Cause Hawaii to amplify the message that Hawaii will be Voting By Mail.
- 2) There must be enough Voter Service Centers and drop boxes in convenient locations with extended hours on all islands.
 - This is especially true given that this will be the first time Hawaii will be implementing Hawaii will be.
 - We must have more than the bare minimum number of Voter Service Centers and drop sites.
- 3) Additionally, we request that registered voters to be allowed to track when ballots are mailed to them and when ballots have been received at the Clerk's Office to alleviate voter angst.



- In Oregon and certain counties of Colorado use a feature called Ballot Trax. The voter signs up online, and then each election, receives text messages alerting them when their ballot has been received, and then counted.
- 4) We suggest having paper Ballots on Demand at Voter Services Centers.
 - We are concerned with only having the Direct Recording Electronic Voting System with Voter Verifiable Paper Audit Trail machines available at Oahu Voter Service Centers.
 - People may not be comfortable and feel secure using voting machines and want to use paper ballots.

Again, Common Cause Hawaii is encouraged to learn of all the steps being taken to ensure proper implementation of the Vote By Mail law.

Common Cause Hawaii wishes to work in a collaborative, cooperative manner with the State Elections Office and the County Clerk's Offices to ensure that no citizen's right to vote is abridged or denied. We want Vote By Mail implementation to proceed smoothly. We are here to help this process succeed and want this process to succeed. A successful Vote By Mail process will pave the way for further modernization efforts.

QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS FOR INFORMATIONAL BRIEFING ON ACT 136 Status Update on Statewide Vote by Mail Process

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports the implementation of a vote by mail system commencing in 2020, as mandated by Act 136, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019. For some people with disabilities, voting by mail may be the most accessible way to cast ballots. However, for others, it could make it more difficult to vote. That said, DCAB offers the following questions and comments:

- As it relates to persons with disabilities, how will the implementation of voting by mail ensure compliance with the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) of 2002? HAVA established a clear mandate to ensure that all Americans with disabilities be given the same opportunity for access and participation that other voters receive, including security, privacy, and independence.
- 2. Act 136 provides for the establishment of voter service centers for purposes including the provision of voting machine services for persons with disabilities. What criteria is being used to determine the number and locations of such centers?
- 3. What additional measures (e.g., training for voter service center workers, increased accessibility to registration and voting materials, additional resources available to election officials) are being considered to eliminate barriers for people with disabilities?

According to the U.S. Election Assistance Commission, for vote-by-mail states to comply with HAVA, there still should be an option to vote in person and have access to a voting machine with adaptive technology to provide the voter, no matter their disability, with the ability to vote privately and independently. Additionally, materials developed in preparation for elections by mail, such as training videos or other multimedia, need to be made accessible for individuals with communication disabilities. This includes, but is not limited to, Braille, large print, or alternate text for individuals with vision impairments, and captioning or sign language interpreters for individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing.
