National Context

- Farm Bill expired; funding gaps for key programs
- Shutdown furloughed USDA staff and delayed payments
- Tariffs increasing input and market costs
- Climate-smart and renewable energy programs cut












Hawaii vs. Mainland Farm Programs

- No crop insurance for many Hawaii crops
- Disaster programs designed for mainland weather
- Marketing assistance rarely applies to specialty crops
- Climate-Smart was among few programs that fit our systems

Broken trust makes producers hesitant to engage with federal programs





View from the Farm: Three C's

Cost

Input prices rising 10-20% from tariffs

Certainty

 Contracts canceled with federal funding cuts

Continuity

USDA delays stalling farm planning



Workforce Crisis

- Big Island coffee workers arrested/deported
- ICE mistakenly detained Laie farmer
- Legal workers staying away due to fear
- H-2A processing delays and rising complexity
- Small farmer difficulties navigating federal H2-A program



Hawaii Grown

Immigration Raids Throw Long Shadow Over Big Island Coffee Harvest

As their workers are arrested and deported, flee the country or stay away, coffee farmers are struggling to bring in a bumper crop.

Hawaii Needs Policy Meeting Our Reality

- Support for diversified operations
- Recognition that sustainable = economically smart
- Assistance scaled to small/medium operations
- Disaster programs tailored for Hawaii conditions
- Modernize Medicaid Income Eligibility for Variable-Income Workers
- State leadership needed for food security
