At this stage, the House has completed hearings on House bills through our committees and voted the remaining measures out of the chamber, sending them to the Senate for consideration. We are now entering the “Crossover” period, when the House begins reviewing and hearing Senate bills as they start their journey through our committees.

Crossover is an important part of the legislative process because it ensures that every bill receives continued public input, thoughtful debate, and potential amendments as it moves between chambers. While many bills advance to this stage, not all will ultimately pass. For bill introducers, this process provides valuable feedback and testimony that can help refine proposals for future sessions if needed.

As the House begins hearing Senate bills, I encourage you to stay engaged. Please do not hesitate to reach out if you have questions, concerns, or opinions about legislation being considered.

2026 LEGISLATIVE BILLS CROSSING OVER TO SENATE

HB1957 HD1: Safe Entry Ways

Establishes, for a city with a population greater than three hundred thousand, enforcement procedures to prevent people or personal property from blocking or otherwise impeding ingress or egress to private doorways and entranceways.



HB2168 HD2: Students Experiencing Homelessness

Requires the Department of Education to establish a program for the support of students experiencing homelessness. Requires the Department to designate a state coordinator position and state navigator positions to implement the program.


HB2167 HD1: Youth Housing Assistance Program

Requires the Office of Youth Services to establish a five-year Youth Housing Stability Assistance Pilot Program to enter into contracts with nonprofit organizations or execute memoranda of agreement with government agencies to support eligible youth with financial assistance.


HB2427 HD2: Unaccompanied Homeless Youth

Entitles unaccompanied homeless youth, including runaway youth, with the rights, as provided by the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act of 1987, to immediate enrollment in school, full participation in school activities, and access to comparable school and educational services provided to other students.



HB2561 HD2: Feral Chickens

Declares feral chickens on public lands as a public nuisance and controllable pest in a city with a population of three hundred thousand or more. Prohibits supporting feral chickens on public lands, including by feeding chickens. Prohibits the abandonment of chickens on public lands or on private property without consent. Establishes fines and authorized enforcing agencies. Appropriates funds for the receipt, handling, and humane disposition of feral chickens that have already been caught.


