LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

February/March 2021

Aloha, friends and neighbors,

I hope that you and your 'ohana have remained safe and healthy during these difficult times. I am honored to serve as your District 7 representative, and look forward to continuing to advocate on behalf of our community.

The State Legislature is considering important legislation to help our State navigate the COVID-19 pandemic, economic downturn, and recovery. This session, I have the honor of serving as the Chair of the House Committee on Water and Land, which focuses on issues related to Hawai'i's land, water, fisheries, boating, marine resources, forestry, wildlife and resource conservation enforcement. This newsletter outlines the session's top priorities for the House of Representatives as a whole, and priority bills moving through the House Committee on Water and Land.

The Hawai'i State House of Representatives is focusing this session on legislative actions to address the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes stabilizing the State's budget, supporting public health infrastructure, and fostering economic recovery. In the Water and Land committee, I am prioritizing initiatives that promote Hawai'i's agricultural industry,

The House Committee on Water and Land reviews legislation on a wide range of issues critical to our district. As Chair of the Water and Land Committee, I am responsible for making decisions as to which bills pass through this committee. Below are some of the priority bills that I have moved through the Water and Land Committee this session for consideration by the next subject matter committee.



Environmental Protection

HB1021: Authorizes the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) to enter into the Interstate Wildlife Violator Compact or similar agreement to assist in the enforcement of wildlife laws.

HB1019: Establishes the Ocean Stewardship Special Fund for the collection and use of moneys for the conservation, restoration, and enhancement of the State's marine resources, and authorizes DLNR to collect user fees.

***HB95:** Authorizes the issuance of special license plates for recognition and protection of the State's natural resources.

HB1016: Requires any person who provides fishing charter services to obtain a commercial marine license, and clarifies that a valid commercial marine vessel license shall satisfy the commercial marine license requirement for all persons taking marine life for commercial purposes on that vessel.

***HB46**: Requires all habitat conservation plans to include an agreement for participants to enter into an annual service contract with a stand-by and response facility available to provide wildlife emergency services.

***HB98 HD1:** Makes violations of the aquatic resources law a misdemeanor, authorizes a criminal fine, and specifies that any equipment or other asset used in intentional violation of the aquatic resources law is subject to forfeiture.

***HB498 HDI:** Authorizes the department of land and natural resources to use in-lieu fee mitigation to restore, create, enhance, or preserve aquatic habitats or resources as compensatory mitigation.



Climate Change

***HB554:** Requires sellers to disclose whether the real property lies within the sea level rise exposure area.

***HB243:** Requires each executive branch department to identify existing and planned facilities that are vulnerable to sea level rise, assess mitigation options, improve interagency coordination for sea level rise adaptation, and submit annual reports.



Affordable Housing

HB902 HD1: Exempts lands set aside by the governor or leased to HHFDC by state agencies from classification as public lands subject to DLNR management. Requires legislative approval prior to the sale or gift of those lands, and requires HHFDC to return any of those lands no longer needed for housing, finance, or development.

HB260 HD1: Authorizes the counties to reclassify lands in certain rural, urban, and agricultural districts, provided that a certain percentage of the housing units on the reclassified lands are set aside for affordable housing projects.

Agriculture and Food Production

HB1346: Requires the department of agriculture to prepare and update a functional plan for seafood sustainability, including wild seafood as a viable food source.

HB1014: Authorizes BLNR to amend and extend existing pasture leases and issue new leases by negotiation to further DLNR public purposes. Gives DLNR priority for lands transferred for productive agricultural uses, and requires a third-party advisory committee to be established before the disposition or transfer of any disputed lands.

HB469 HD1: Supports ranchers by requiring DLNR and DOA to meet and determine by mutual agreement the transfer of agricultural lands. Establishes a third-party committee to review transfers of lands in which DLNR and DOA are unable to reach a mutual agreement.

HB1144: Exempts interisland transportation and related loading and unloading of livestock from the general excise tax (GET). Requires the public utilities commission to authorize preferential water carrier service rates for farm and ranch operators in any county with a population of 500,000 or less.

Effective Government

***HB1149:** Reorganizes and integrates the Land Use Commission within a modified Office of Planning, which is renamed as the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD). Reclassifies the Coastal Zone Management Program and Statewide Sustainability Branch as divisions of within OPSD.

This session, the Hawai'i State House of Representatives is focusing on legislation to address the COVID-19 pandemic. Below are some of the areas that the House has identified as priorities:
