Celebrating the opening of Nāulu Apartments in Hālawā, the Senator reflected on his role in the zoning approval process during his time on the Honolulu City Council. Nā Hulu Wehi Women’s Court Initiative

The Kona community celebrated the launch of Nā Hulu Wehi, a new women’s court program providing trauma-informed, culturally grounded support for justice-involved women. Modeled after the successful Mohala Wāhine program and funded through Act 228, this initiative offers an alternative to incarceration and supports healing, rehabilitation, and stronger families across Hawai‘i.

Restoring the Pearl Harbor Historic Bike Path

The Pearl Harbor Historic Bike Path has officially reopened, featuring upgraded paths, lighting, markings, and signage to improve safety and accessibility for pedestrians, runners, and cyclists. Years in the making, this milestone represents an important step toward strengthening active transportation and connectivity for our community, with more improvements to come.

ADDRESSING SAFETY

New Measures to Address Illegal Fireworks

A recent bill signing marked an important step forward in protecting our communities by strengthening enforcement against illegal fireworks. With the passage of HB 1483, HB 806, HB 550, and SB 222, these measures reinforce public safety efforts and respond directly to community concerns about fireworks-related harm.

SB97 (ACT 170) – Enhancing Traffic Safety

I am honored to share the passage of Senate Bill 97, relating to motor vehicles, which strengthens road safety by increasing penalties for repeat excessive speeding offenses. The measure elevates a third or subsequent violation within five years to a misdemeanor with a mandatory minimum jail sentence of thirty days. This legislation reflects a shared commitment to accountability and protecting our communities from dangerous driving behavior.
