I extend my heartfelt appreciation to my daughter, Malia Cook, and her Whitmore Economic Development Group for spearheading this event. Also collaborating was Senator Donovan Dela Cruz and Mililani High School. The volunteers were surprised by a visit by our Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke, as well as Senator Lynn DeCoite who represents part of Maui County. We ended the day with 38 pallets packed with vital supplies for Maui and almost **\$10,000 cash donations** for Hawai'i Community Foundation-Maui Strong Fund and the American **Red Cross!** 

The legislative session has winded down, yet there is much to do over the interim. During the legislative session, we've tackled some significant issues, and I'm happy to report that several new bills related to education have been signed into law. These laws are all about empowering our educators and students, ensuring that everyone has access to quality education along with increasing our early childhood workforce. As we move forward into the next phase of the year, my commitment remains unwavering in advocating for increased funding and resources for our schools, cultivating the best possible learning environment and healing for our students.

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#### Ways and Means: Maui & Moloka'i Visit

Before the devastating Maui wildfire, I had the opportunity to visit multiple sites on Maui and Moloka'i as a member of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means (WAM) in July. State officials and community members provided tours and presentations on a range of priorities including economic and workforce development, investments in infrastructure, the formation of a food and product innovation network, the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission, and the future of Kalaupapa. Kalaupapa has only four leprosy residents remaining. Discussions have begun as to what the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands will do with this property



once these residents pass on. Site visits like these, especially on the neighbor islands and rural areas, allow me to learn about various State programs and projects, engage in discussion with leaders from public and private sectors, and learn from those working first-hand within our communities. Lt. Gov. Luke, representatives from the Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation, the Department of Accounting and General Services, and the Transit-Oriented Development Council shared plans for workforce housing and preschools developing across Maui County.

The overwhelming success of the donation drive resulted in over 10,000 pounds of toiletries, diapers, baby formula, toys, clothing, bedding, household goods, and non-perishable food delivered to Maui. I am sincerely thankful for all our neighbors for their donations, our volunteers for organizing and packaging muchneeded goods, and the donations of food and supplies in support of our volunteers. Witnessing the O'ahu community unite in such a significant manner to stand by our Maui 'ohana is truly inspiring and is an uplifting reminder of the collective strength that Hawai'i embodies.

## Early Childhood Educator Stipend Program

We celebrated the launch of the Early Childhood Educator Stipend Program, which received a significant allocation of \$660,000 from the state budget. This initiative aims to support UH students enrolled in early childhood education programs by providing tuition stipends. As a collaborative effort between the Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL), the University of Hawai'i (UH) system, and through generous donations from the Samuel N. and Mary Castle Foundation, the program reflects a shared commitment to nurturing the early childhood workforce and fostering the growth of young minds. I am grateful to our legislative partners, including Lt. Gov. Luke and Rep. Woodson, for recognizing the importance of well-trained educators in expanding preschool access.



## **Education Initatives Bill Signing**

Governor Green recently signed a set of education bills aimed at improving early childhood education, workforce development, teacher housing, and funding for school facilities. Notably, Senate Bill 941 allocated \$170 million for teacher housing at three high schools. Other bills established a Child Care Accreditation Program to assist childcare providers in obtaining accreditation and expanded the Preschool Open Doors Program, providing better access to high-quality preschool education. These measures reflect the Legislature's strong commitment to enhancing early learning and education and the successful collaboration between our public and private agencies; our collective efforts play a crucial role in meeting critical educational needs and creating a nurturing environment for every child while providing teachers the necessary tools to succeed.
