

## **Senator Mike Gabbard** Legislative update...



Aloha e Friends,

We just completed a Special Session to provide additional funding for the rail transit project. After much debate, we passed SB 4, which will provide an additional \$2.37 billion to complete the 20-mile project from East Kapolei to Ala Moana. I supported the additional funding, because this project greatly benefits Senate District 20 and the legislation did include a requirement that the state conduct aforensic audit to get to the bottom of why rail costs have escalated from \$5.42 in 2014 to \$10 billion today. Here are the major features of the bill:

- Increases the Transit Accommodation Tax from 9.25% to 10.25% for 13 years from 2018 to 2031.
- Extends the existing half-percent General Excise Tax (GET)

surcharge on O'ahu from 2027 to 2030.

- Decreases the state's skim of the GET surcharge from 10% to 1%.
- Permanently increases the counties' share of the Transit Accommodation Tax from \$93 million to \$103 million.
- Requires state to conduct a forensic audit and annual reviews of HART.
- Creates a mass transit special fund and requires the State Comptroller to certify HART's expenditures.
- Requires the Senate President and House Speaker to appoint 2 non-voting, ex-officio members to the HART Board of Directors. #### **Board and Commission Confirmations**

During the Special Session, the Senate also took action on the confirmation of 57 people to various state Board and Commissions, including the UH Board of Regents, Land Use Commission, Public Utilities Commission, Hawai'i Community Development Authority, and Deputy to the Chairperson for the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR).

As the Chair of the Agriculture and Environment Committee, I headed up the confirmation process for Lisa Spain and Loyal Mehrhoff of the *Endangered Species Recovery Committee* (ESRC). The ESRC is made up of seven members and serves as a consultant to the Board of Land and Natural Resources and DLNR on matters relating to endangered, threatened, proposed, and candidate species.

**Pueo Study Update** 

I met with DLNR and UH staff on August 21st to get the latest update on the study of the population size, distribution and habitat use of the Hawaiian Short-eared Owl, the pueo.

Dr. Javier Cotin, the lead researcher at UH, is currently conducting the island-wide surveys on the prevalence of pueo on our island. As of August, the researchers have detected 11 pueo at 7 different sites. The pueo report will be completed by the UH researcher by April 2018.

UH would like to do an additional two-year study which would include breeding and foraging ecology research. I'll support an appropriation at the Legislature in the hopes of making that happen.

#### In Memory of Jack Dameron

I participated in the Memorial Service for Jack Dameron at Borthwick Mortuary in Honolulu on August 21st. Jack was a longtime Makakilo resident and served his country in the U.S. Navy. Jack entered the Navy as an enlisted man, worked his way through the enlisted ranks, and became an officer on December 1, 1964. He continued to climb the ladder to his final rank of CMDR, retiring on July 31, 1991. While in the Navy, Jack met his future wife, Norma Gloria Lopez, from Honduras. At the time of their meeting Norma spoke very little English, but the romance blossomed into a marriage that was still going strong after 62 years. Jack was father to two sons, Von and Dean, as well as being a grandfather and great-grandfather. He relished his role of being a provider to his family and was always there when family members were in time of need. He was sometimes tough, as any 38-year military man might be, but also very kind, caring, and compassionate. Jack was actively involved in his neighborhood and community. For over ten years, he attended my monthly community "Listen Story" meetings.

'Ulu, or breadfruit, may be one of the most useful, versatile, and amazing crops in the world. Almost every part of the tree can be used to make food, medicine, and crafts.

'Ulu is gluten-free, high in protein, and a low fat starch. It is rich in calcium, magnesium, essential amino acids, as well as,

high-yielding. It has more potential to address Hawai'i's food security issues than any other crop. Breadfruit was one of the canoe plants brought to Hawai'i by the first Polynesian settlers for food, shelter, clothing, medicine, and more.

Hawaiians used latex from the 'ulu's trunk to treat skin conditions, as glue for canoes, and to catch birds for their feathers. The light, durable wood was crafted into drums, poi boards, canoes, and surfboards.

Extensive fields of breadfruit trees once covered the lower slopes of the West Maui Mountains. As Agriculture and Environment Committee Chair, I'll continue to support efforts to invest in the research and increased cultivation of this incredible crop.
