### Funds Released to Moanalua Elementary School

Senator Kim and Representative Aiu worked together to secure funding for Moanalua Elementary School's multipurpose innovation center last Legislative biennium. Mahalo Governor Green for releasing \$3,147,000 for the construction and implementation of it. This will provide a space designed to facilitate a variety of innovative activities. The center enables students to explore their innovation needs, from brainstorming ideas to bringing projects to life.

### Senator Kim's Bill Introduction

**SB 1542** - Relating to Age Verification App Developers and App Stores

Requires app store providers to determine the age category for each of their users in the State and verify their age, provide a mechanism for parents to block minors from downloading unsuitable apps; and obtain parental consent before allowing a minor to use their app store to download and purchase apps.

**SB 1544** - Relating to Wireless Communication Devices in Schools

Requires each public school to implement a policy to prohibit students from using cellular phones and other wireless communication devices during school hours, subject to exceptions for education, health, and emergencies.

**SB 1545** - Relating to Nepotism

Repeals language in the State's Code of Ethics that exempts the Legislative Branch from prohibitions against nepotism in public employment.
