Medal of Honor Ceremony set for March 29

Every session the House and Senate hold a joint presentation to award the Medal of Honor to military service members with ties to Hawaii who have sacrificed their lives for our country and freedom. Created in 2005 through Act 21, the medal has been awarded to over two hundred men and women who were killed in action as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom.

This year's ceremony will begin at 2pm on March 29th, 2011, in the Hawaii State Senate Chambers. The gallery will be open to the general public with limited seating. Session will also be broadcast live via public access television and streamed on demand via the senate webcast page.

Wailuku II Elementary School

With recent delays worked out, groundbreaking on the new Wailuku II Elementary School might soon be underway. According to the Department of Education, the \$31,255,000 construction contract for the new school was awarded to Primatech Construction on January 7, 2011 and submitted building permit applications currently awaiting approval.

In response to Central Maui's growing population, in 2007 the Legislature appropriated funds to plan, design and construct the new school. Set to be built in the 2,000-home Kehalani subdivision, Wailuku II Elementary will house approximately 550 students and is expected to take two years to construct.

"I'm happy to see progress on this project as it has been a long time coming," said Senate President Tsutsui, "Wailuku II Elementary will reduce overcrowding in our schools and I look forward to its groundbreaking and completion."
