House Bill 2216 HD2 SD2

Along with the passage of many other community-based care services below, **HB2216**, Increases the state supplemental payment ceilings for type I adult residential care homes, licensed developmental disabilities domiciliary homes, community care foster family homes, certified adult foster homes, and type II adult residential care homes.

\$15.5 Million awarded for community based services!

House Bill 1974 HD1

This bill reduces the minimum number of years required from 10 to 5 years to be eligible for vested benefit status for service retirement.

Reducing the minimum number of years of credited service from 10 to 5 years without any fiscal impact would deeply help employees with recruitment and retain their employees.

HCR94 HD2/HR78

Requesting the Department of Human Services to conduct a study on the feasibility of increasing the Medicaid reimbursement payment rate for Hawaii's Community Care Foster Family Homes and expanded adult residential care homes for Medicaid clients every ten years.

HCR91 HD1/HR75

Requesting the Department of Human Services to establish a working group to address issues relating to reimbursements and payments to home and community-based services providers.
