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DELIVERING MORE TAX RELIEF FOR HAWAII WORKING FAMILIES

Improving on 2024's historic tax relief SB3125, Act 26 of 2026, was signed into law on May 21, 2026. The average family of four will now save a total of \$16,278 over the next 5 years, from 2027 – 2031. The average Hawai'i household will see an **increase** in their take home pay. Below is an example of a family of four making \$88k/year.

Year	Tax Savings from Act 46, 2024	Tax Savings from SB3125, 2026

2029	\$3,283	\$3,437
2030	\$3,393	\$3,537
2031	\$3,613	\$3,737
Total:	\$15,625	↑ \$16,278

Act 24 of 2026, creates more savings and relief for the middle class and creates a new tax bracket for millionaires. It preserves 100% of the tax cuts for working families from 2024. Below is estimated results for Joint filers in 2028:

There are no cuts to existing benefits, higher contributions are only for top earners. Households earning under \$350k will continue to see sustained tax savings and additional benefits under Act 24 of 2026.
