Mililani Middle School (MMS)

History

- 1998 Opens as the first multi-track school to accommodate 1,350 students
 - **▶** Built to accommodate 1,350 students
 - > Current student body is 1,867 students
- 2010 HRS 302A-251 (Act 167)
 - Requires the phasing in of implementation of a certain number of student instructional hours at all public schools, multi-track and charter schools are exempt from the law
- 2014 Result of Act 167
 - ➤ MMS confirms the expected annual loss of 42 student instructional days by SY 18-19
- 2015 Senators Dela Cruz and Kidani introduce SB1345 (Act 116)
 - Requires the Dept. of Education to develop a transition plan to end multitrack schools




Senate Bill 1345



- Introduced by Sen. Kidani & Dela Cruz
- Act 116 (2015)
- Requires the Dept. of Education to develop a transition plan to end multi-track schedules in public schools and report to the legislature regarding the plan and any proposed legislation.

Act 21 (2015)

Student Hours Law

- Updates HRS 302A-251
 - Amends the definition of student instructional hours to student hours which now includes recess, lunch, and passing time

Minimum Hours:

For SY 2015-16

- ➤ 180 day school year
- Minimum 990 hours(secondary schools)

Beginning SY 2016-17

- > 180 day school year
- Minimum of 1080 hours (all schools)

Act 21 (2015)

Student Hours Law

At 171 days per school year and 1845 students minutes per week:

 MMS students will receive an equivalent of five days less than the minimum student hour requirement

Based on SY 2014-15 data:

- MMS students are still afforded the least number of student hours per school year, out of all secondary public schools in the state
- MMS students are still afforded the fourth lowest number of student hours per school year, out of all public schools in the state

Reasons to Transition to a Single Track

Challenges


- Conflicting school schedules for families with children in multiple grade levels
- Quality family time
- Scheduling appropriate and affordable inter-session care
- Student absenteeism for those who participate in sports or are traveling

Benefits

- Creates a common calendar for Mililani families
- Opportunity for MMS students to participate in summer school and summer programs
- Opportunity for MMS to perform major facility maintenance and routine classroom maintenance
- School funds used for 10 month calendar vs 12 month calendar

This is in response to your email on March 17, 2015, regarding park dedication land credits for Milliani Mauka Community Park (Park), Tax Map Key 9-5-002:033.

You indicated Millilani Middle School is exploring options for expansion, including the use of a portion of the Park which may reduce the existing park area by up to one acre.

Our records indicate the 12.122-acre Milliani Mauka Community Park has approximately 4.23 acres of unused land credits surplus to the Milliani Mauka development by Castle & Cooke. As the Park has already been dedicated to the City, you may wish to coordinate with the Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) and with Castle & Cooke regarding any proposals for future use of the portion of the Park.

- Castle & Cooke deeds 12.122 acres for Mililani Mauka Community Park in 1999 (4.23 additional acres dedicated)
- Deed restricts 12.122 acres for "Park Area" only
- Castle & Cooke has agreed to swap the "Park Area" restriction for a "Educational Purpose" restriction for acreage DOE will use
