






- Children in poverty: 17%

NATIVE HAWAIIAN EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT in the State of Hawai'i: 2006-2010




N. HAWAIIAN Total State

in the State of Hawai'i: 2006-2010






HOUSEHOLD INCOME in the State of Hawai'i: 2012









Pilot Youth Development Flag Rugby Program

- Castle-Kahuku Complex Area
- Nānākuli-Waiʿanae Complex Area
- Ka'u-Kea'au-Pāhoa Complex Area

Facts

- These three complex areas have <u>high concentrations of Native</u> <u>Hawaiian and Pacific Islander</u> student populations.
- These two ethnicities <u>comprise the majority of our prison</u> <u>population</u>.
- Only **16 DOE/charter middle and intermediate** schools were able to receive funding through R.E.A.C.H (Resources for Enrichment, Athletics, Culture, and Health)

Rugby4Good

The **<u>R4G</u>** education course and curriculum highlights explicitly the integration of rugby values and associated behaviors through Play Rugby USA's unique "<u>value in action</u>" framework. The effective delivery of value in action through sports based youth development programs is what provides the solution to <u>reducing</u> the risk factors for our youth.






Play Rugby USA Hawaii Existing Program Infrastructure

<u>SCR 187 – SR 122</u>

Encourages the Department of Education (DOE) to establish a pilot youth development flag rugby program aimed at reducing risky behaviors and incarceration rates among Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander youth

<u>SCR 185 – SR 120</u>

Requesting the Department of Education (DOE) to organize and coordinate out-of-school programs for kindergarten through twelfth grade and identify funding opportunities for current and future DOE out-of-school programs.

Tomorrow, in Southern California, the San Mateo Police Athletic League's (PAL's) rugby program will be handed the 2008-2009 Distinguished Program Award by the state Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. The occasion is the State Juvenile Officers' Association Conference. All of the police and community people involved in thinking up and running the two-year-old rugby program must be beaming.

This isn't a typical PAL program (PAL sponsors activities ranging from ballet to volleyball, with the objective to not only give kids from 5 to 18 years old something to do, but also to build relationships between cops and their communities).

Instead, the rugby program was designed specifically to help Polynesian, or Pacific Islander, youth of high school age avoid the downward spiral of becoming gang members. And of those Polynesians, the predominant group in San Mateo is Tongans.


- Community rugby leagues administered programs could lead to a professional rugby league
