Focus on public education

Earlier this month, more than a thousand residents from across the state attended an all-day education forum at the Hawaii Convention Center. The session was part of the public outreach effort by Governor Ige's team of 19 volunteer advisors charged with developing a blueprint for refocusing the way instruction is provided for our public school students.

The summit's focal point was new federal legislation – the *Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)* – that shifts greater responsibility for student success and leadership accountability away from federally-mandated standards to the state level. The conference was an inspiring indicator of widespread public interest in improving public school instruction by empowering the Department of Education, principals and teachers to meet our students' needs in the most appropriate ways to ensure they are able to meet life and career goals.

As Chair of the Senate Committee on Education, I serve on the Governor's ESSA Team. I invited Lee Posey, an education policy expert from the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL), to present a legislative perspective at the summit. Then last week I accompanied Ms. Posey to a round of Town Hall community meetings in Hilo, Wailuku and Kapa'a to discuss ESSA with neighbor island audiences. There will be many other opportunities for public input for the ESSA Team to consider as we formulate recommendations and a plan of action for the Governor and the DOE, and we invite your participation.

Mililani High School history teacher Amy Perruso serves on the ESSA Team, as do Brennan Lee – MHS Class of 2016 outgoing student representative on the Board of Education, and Waipahu High School's innovative Principal Keith Hayashi. We are all hopeful that the flexibility in the new law will be an incentive for the DOE to more formally recognize that principals and teachers can best judge what's needed for their students and campus communities.

The Team and the DOE plan to submit an initial report to the Board of Education in November, and the Board will then schedule public meetings and other opportunities for public comment.
