Waipahu High a model for the state

One of the delights of opening day at the legislature is the opportunity to meet and greet so many people who visit my office during our post-session open house. I was pleased to welcome DOE Area Superintendent Rodney Luke and Waipahu High School Principal Keith Hayashi and several of his colleagues from WHS who were making the rounds with much to brag about in the way of accomplishments for students at this legacy campus.

The two gentlemen on my left are Rodney Luke—DOE Complex Area Superintendent for the area that includes Waipahu High School—and Keith Hayashi, WHS Principal.



Waipahu High has become the leader in

enrolling its students in early college classes through UH West Oahu and Leeward Community College, serving in many ways as a model for other campuses statewide. I was heartened by items in Governor Ige's budget that request some \$9 million over the next two years for expansion of the Early College program to all public high schools. About two dozen schools offered students on their campuses the opportunity to earn college credit last year — with the cost of tuition and books covered — giving graduating seniors a real advantage as they head off to college.

While the public mainly sees the entertainment programs and other activities around the Capitol from our opening session, much work is being done behind the scenes. Hundreds of bills have been introduced in the first two weeks of our session, and hearings on dozens of them are underway. Many bills are important measures that did not pass last year for one reason or another, others are introduced at the request of constituents, and I have my own set of bills that I have originated.

The Hawaii Chapter of the American Red Cross is reminding us about their life saving home fire preparedness campaign. The Department of Health and the Department of Education are again sponsoring the "Stop Flu at School" program to administer flu shots for students in Hawaii elementary and middle schools. Teams will be at Waipahu Intermediate on February 2 and at Waipahu Elementary on February 9 to cover students who have turned in their parent-permission forms. Kaleiopuu Elementary is on the list for inoculations on February 14. Incidents of flu are being reported on the mainland in higher numbers than in the recent past. The vaccination program is a great way to help stop its spread here in Hawaii before it becomes a problem.
