EMS improvements on the way

About a year from now, we will all be celebrating the grand opening of the new ambulance station in Waipio Gentry near McDonald's. We broke ground for the facility earlier this month, and everyone there for ceremonial beginning of construction agreed that "It's about time!"

We all knew that a permanent home for paramedics who staffed Emergency Medical Services operations was critically needed to replace the temporary warehouse location for the Waipio ambulance. Waipio crews responded to about 4,500 emergency calls last year. It's a very busy location, as the resident population in Central and West Oahu has grown, with new developments at Ho'opili and Koa Ridge on the way.

These services are funded by the State Department of Health, with EMS paramedic personnel and equipment provided by the City & County. This was a high priority project in my first legislative session in 2009 and funding was quickly approved. Unfortunately, the previous administration didn't encumber the funds and the appropriation lapsed. We re-appropriated the money in 2013, and I worked closely with Mayor Caldwell and Managing Director Roy Amemiya to ensure that the new station would move from drawing board to ground breaking as quickly as possible.

Although the original plan and design had to be scaled back to remove the auxiliary emergency communications and command center because project costs increased since the original appropriation, residents of Waipio and surrounding communities absolutely deserve this enhanced EMS capability, and I am so pleased to have played a part in making it a reality.
