With the conclusion of the 2024 legislative session, I have reflected on the numerous community events in which I had the honor of participating, celebrating the remarkable accomplishments of our students across Mililani, Waipahu, and Pearl City. The commitment and innovation of our educators, faculty, and staff in the Hawai'i State Department of Education (DOE) continue to inspire me, as they play a foundational role in nurturing the potential of our young learners.

In celebration of their academic excellence, I provided Kidani Awards at several elementary schools, including Kanoelani, Kalei'opu'u, Mililani Waena, and Honowai. It was a joy to witness the enthusiasm and pride of our school communities and their families during their year-end ceremonies.

This session, the Legislature has made substantial progress in enhancing our schools statewide. Notably, we passed key legislation which established a Harm to Students Registry and allocated funds to strengthen educational resources for our Native Hawaiian students at Kaiapuni (Hawaiian language immersion) schools. We also secured funding for several important Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) after visiting schools in the district and meeting with principals and students to understand their top priorities. Enclosed in this newsletter, you will find a detailed breakdown of the legislative advancements made this session, an overview of the state budget allocations, and updates on CIP that will benefit our district. During the interim, I remain committed to continuing our work to enhance the educational experiences of our keiki and to support the dedicated professionals who make their successes possible.

Last but not least, I extend my warmest aloha and congratulations to our Mililani, Pearl City, and Waipahu High School graduates! The commencement ceremonies were a profound testament to the resilience, dedication, and academic prowess of our students. It was uplifting to see their accomplishments being celebrated by friends, family, and our wider community. I hope you and your 'ohana enjoy a safe and joyful summer. NOTABLE BILLS OF 2024

SB = Senate Bill; HB = House Bill; *CD = Conference Draft

*Conference draft (CD) is a final version of a bill agreed upon by both the Senate and House during a conference committee.

SB2475 SD2 HD2 CD1: RELATING TO EDUCATION.

It is important for our keiki to receive education in a safe and secure environment. This measure, the first in Hawai'i, establishes a Harm to Students Registry to ensure safer learning environments and hold accountable those who have committed egregious actions towards students, preventing them from securing employment at other educational institutions. The registry will contain information about school employees, contractors, or volunteers who have been found to have inflicted harm on a student after an investigation.

HB2404 HD1 SD1 CD1: RELATING TO INCOME TAX.

This bill increases the standard deduction amounts and adjusts income tax brackets, which designate how much tax is owed for different levels of income, every two years from 2025 to 2031. Enacted on June 3, 2024 as Act 46, this became the biggest tax cut in the state's history, benefiting working families beginning with the 2024 tax return.

SB2305 SD2 HD2 CD1: RELATING TO MISSING PERSONS.

This bill establishes a silver alert program to help locate and safeguard missing kupuna, as well as those who are cognitively impaired, or developmentally disabled.

SB2476 HD2 CD1: RELATING TO DENTAL HYGIENISTS.

This bill permits licensed dental hygienists to perform preventive dental sealant screenings and apply preventive dental sealants in a school-based dental program. This is a proactive step to address tooth decay among Hawai'i's children.

HB2074 HD2 SD1 CD1: RELATING TO KAIAPUNI EDUCATION.

Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools of the Hawai'i State Department of Education (DOE) deliver instruction in the Hawaiian language. Offering a bicultural and bilingual learning environment, there has been a significant increase in demand for Hawaiian language immersion education over the past decade. There are currently 22 Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools, but there is a growing need for more teachers and resources to meet the demand and ensure quality education. This measure aims to ensure sufficient staff for both new and existing Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools by allocating \$3.5 million for fiscal year 2024-2025 for Hawaiian language immersion education, including funding for three full-timeequivalent Kaiapuni education curriculum specialist II positions and 10 full-time-equivalent Kaiapuni classroom teacher positions.

SB2943 SD2 HD1 CD1: RELATING TO WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT.

Due to the critical role that commercial drivers license (CDL) drivers play in the State's infrastructure, this measure will establish a working group within the Department of Transportation to address the scarcity and availability of CDL drivers in the State. The workforce shortage of CDL drivers directly impacts the State's education system, where over 200 additional CDL drivers are required to fully cover school bus routes statewide.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

Mililani Uka Elementary: \$1.5M for the design and construction of telecom improvements, including upgrading the telecommunication system used for safety drills, active shooter incidents, and daily announcements.

Honowai Elementary School: \$1.95M to finance the design and construction of ADA improvements. This funding will be used to make repairs to elevators, ensure safe pathways, and address safety concerns for special needs or impaired students and staff with health and mobility issues.

Kanoelani Elementary School: \$150K for construction to install light poles with floodlights. The campus is dimly lit at night, so proper lighting is essential for campus security and nighttime events, especially as we use the new covered stage area at the back of the campus, which was approved by a separate budget.

LEGISLATIVE BIENNIUM 2023 THROUGH 2024: BY THE NUMBERS

The Hawai'i State Legislature operates on a biennial, or two-year, cycle. The Thirty-Second Legislature, which began in 2023, concludes in 2024. Here is a quick snapshot of legislative activities my office has administered during this period.







Hawai'i DOE Launches CPR/AED Training Pilot Program

The DOE has recently launched a pilot program for cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and automated external defibrillator (AED) training in partnership with the Hawai'i Heart Foundation. The initiative aims to provide CPR education and AED training to selected schools throughout the state, ensuring that students are equipped with lifesaving skills. I participated in the program's launch at Mililani High School (MHS), where our students and I received hands-on instruction in essential techniques. The training session was conducted by Dr. Elizabeth "Libby" Char, former Director of the Hawai'i Department of Health, along with nurses from the UH Manoa Nancy Atmospera-Walch School of Nursing's Hawai'i Keiki: Healthy and Ready to Learn program.

Funded by the state legislature through Act 143, Session Laws of Hawaii 2023, the pilot program aims to enhance cardiac survival rates in Hawai'i by training approximately 20,000 students annually. As reported by the Hawai'i Heart Foundation, this training is crucial for improving survival rates as bystanders currently perform CPR in less than one in three cardiac arrests. At the end of the training program, each student will receive a CPR/AED competency card, recognizing their proficiency and knowledge in lifesaving skills under the Good Samaritan Law.

This program not only prepares our youth to respond effectively in emergencies but also empowers them to assist family members and community members. I am proud to support this program and look forward to its expansion in high schools statewide, which will make a lasting impact on the health and safety of our communities.

I am excited to share that 'Iolani Palace welcomes all residents to Kama'āina Sunday, a free event where guests can explore the palace, immerse themselves in Hawaiian culture, taste 'ono food, support local vendors, and enjoy lively entertainment. Kama'āina Sunday is held on the second Sunday of every month, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. A valid Hawai'i State ID, driver's license, or proof of residency is required for each complimentary ticket, with one ticket per resident. EOEL Public Prekindergarten Program Accepting Applications for SY 2024-2025

The Executive Office of Early Learning (EOEL) is accepting applications to its Public Prekindergarten Program for the 2024-2025 school year. To qualify, children must be 3 or 4 years old by July 31, 2024. Priority admission is extended to English as a second language learners, children in foster care, those experiencing homelessness or unstable housing, and those placed through individualized education programs in a general education setting. Applications for these priority groups are open until September 30. After this, any remaining spots will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis until the end of the school year.

I urge our families to visit <u>earlylearning.hawaii.gov</u> to apply and to find more information about the program. This is a wonderful opportunity to give your child a solid foundation in early education.

You may've noticed that Senator Kidani was my guest at both the OIA and HHSAA Championship Games. You see Senator Kidani is a softball trailblazer in the Mililani Community. She helped to organize the Bobby Sox league in Central Oahu. In 1988, the Mililani Bobby Sox team was the first Hawai'i Bobby Sox team to travel outside of Hawai'i and compete at Nationals. It was an exceptional team. One of the reasons it was special is that one of its

stand out players was none other than today's Head of the Trojan Softball Team: Coach Rose Antonio! So when our team won the OIA and State Championship titles this year, it was so much fun to ask Coach Kidani to present the Championship trophy to her former player, Coach Antonio! [...]
