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Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

The Legislative session is a little more than half-way through the 60-day calendar, moving toward our scheduled adjournment in early May. Several people have told me they are curious about what's going on at the Capitol this year. They may be reacting to the fact that there do not appear to be many high-profile issues on the table this year.

I can offer a possible explanation for this. The state operates on a two-year budget cycle, with the major framework for state spending formulated in the first year. This year is the second or "supplemental" budget year, where additional funds are allocated for those programs that really need to make adjustments, or for genuine emergencies that need to be addressed. Our restraints on spending remain in place, of course, based on forecasts of state revenues by the Council on Revenues. The Council issued its last guidelines earlier this month - no anticipated change in tax collections for 2016. Their next meeting is not until late May, after our session has adjourned. The bottom line: the two-year budget and spending plan we formulated last year remains pretty much in place.

Having said that, there is no question that there are still challenges that need to be addressed. Suitable appropriate assistance for the homeless and affordable housing for our growing resident population have so far avoided any meaningful solutions. The goal of diversifying our economy beyond the sometimes fickle visitor industry has not yet been met, although the construction industry has shown strength. The unemployment rate reached a record low last month, and so conventional wisdom says that if someone wants to work, there are jobs available.

In my own focus on education, I have again and again attempted to gain funding for state pre-K programs we created last year. That will remain a priority until full support has been approved. And I do support cooling our classrooms.

This month we took several days to salute excellence in education leadership, our wonderful state teachers of the year, and our inspiring students during Education Week at the Capitol. Notes from the Capitol

Spot-checking some bills as Legislative deadlines approach

Here are some education and other bills that I am tracking. As we approach internal legislative deadlines, the status of these bills – including whether or not they are still alive, or will no longer be considered this session – may be determined at the online site: http://capitol.hawaii.gov. Enter the bill number in the appropriate box to find details.



Education bills:

- ♦ <u>SB3126</u>, and a companion bill in the House, <u>HB2569</u>: These bills would appropriate funds to the Department of Education for school air conditioning. The House bill includes additional provisions about sustainable energy use.
- <u>SB2782</u> creates incentives for Educational Assistants to become teachers, rewarding them for working at schools where there is high teacher turnover.
- SB2425 would clarify ethics law provisions as they apply to teachers who arrange for travel for educational trips.
- SB2426 would prohibit schools from denying a student a meal for lack of lunch money for a reasonable period of time.
- ♦ <u>SB814</u> Requires the Board of Education to name the new public high school in Kihei, Maui, the "Patsy Takemoto Mink Kihei High School" in honor of Hawaii's late Congresswoman Patsy Mink.

Some other bills of interest:

- ♦ <u>SB3034</u> proposes an amendment to the State Constitution to establish rights for victims of crime also known as "Marsy's Law." This is a bill that the Mililani Neighborhood Board supported at the February meeting.
- ♦ <u>HB1072</u> authorizes the Board of Psychology to grant prescription authority to psychologists. Members of the Mililani Board have previously contacted me in opposition to this bill; I voted to approve it with reservations. The Senate Committee on Ways and Means must act on this bill by April 8 for it to remain alive.
- <u>SB2886</u> lowers age of consent for mental health services from 18 to 12. I did hear opposition to this bill at the Mililani Board meeting last month; however, I voted to approve it. The bill is currently pending in the House Judiciary Committee.


