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Aloha friends and neighbors,

Our major focus in this 2017 Legislative session has been on the state budget for the two-year period beginning July 1. A detailed spending plan is now ready for final approval this week as we move toward adjournment on Thursday, May 4. My priority, as Chair of the Education Committee, has been to support our youngsters and their teachers in our public schools. Here are a few notes:

I am pleased that the budget includes funds to support the state's Early College Initiative so that this program that has been so successful at Waipahu High School can be implemented on other campuses. There is also support for a Keiki Healthy and Ready to Learn health assessment and monitoring program in schools beyond the initial, very successful pilot phase. We are also providing funds for a "Hawaii Promise" initiative that will supplement financial aid for University of Hawaii students.

There are still other items pending approval, including funding bills that are separate from the regular budget. The major question of how best to support the city's rail project in Senate Bill 1183 remained unresolved until further deliberations later this week.

School construction projects that affect families in Senate District 18 are detailed on page 2 of the newsletter.


Waipahu students headed for Intel Science Fair in California

Billion-dollar construction budget impacts Senate District 18 families

Here are some construction projects for which funds are allocated in the state budget for the two years beginning July 1, 2017

- Waipahu High School \$15 million for a new classroom building
- Waipahu Intermediate School \$600,000 for multi-purpose playcourts
- Waipahu Elementary School \$275,000 for cafeteria improvements
- Kanoelani Elementary School \$800,000 for construction of a portable classroom building
- Waikele Elementary School \$1.4 million for construction of a six-classroom building; \$850,000 for upgrades to the electrical system and replacement of furnishings
- Mililani High School \$2 million for planning for a Performing Arts Center; \$350,000 for planning to enclose a courtyard and extend an existing building
- Mililani Middle School \$11.5 million for a 15-classroom building. This is a major step toward moving MMS off the multi-track school schedule back to the standard school year calendar
- UH West Oahu \$2.5 million for improvements to the maintenance building; \$50,000 for improvements to the library

Roosevelt Bridge - dedicated 83 years ago and named for President Franklin Delano Roosevelt - has been showing its age. Over the next 18-20 months, major rehabilitation work will make it stronger and safer, even providing shared shoulder lane space for bicyclists and runners. The state is funding 20 % of the \$15 million cost; the remainder will be covered by the Federal Highway Administration.

It was a true honor to be invited to address the annual convention of the **Hawaii State Teachers Association.** And I was deeply touched when they presented me a plaque "in appreciation for advocacy and dedication to our public schools." Legislation to establish a dedicated funding base to help finance our schools failed this session. This bill asked that a question be put on the 2018 ballot for <u>voters</u> to decide on allowing a tax surcharge to be dedicated to education. A new collective bargaining agreement gives our teachers pay increases and improved benefits that should help to address the chronic teacher retention and recruiting challenges we face year after year.

Hawaii's 13,500 public school teachers remained unified through our legislative session as we worked toward increasing resources for our schools and our *keiki*.



Rat lungworm is a growing concern. Here's advice from the State Department of Health.

About a dozen cases of rat lungworm disease have been confirmed since the beginning of the year on Hawaii Island and Maui. The disease has been in the islands for five decades as a parasitic worm in rats that can infect snails, slugs, freshwater shrimp, land crabs and frogs that eat rat feces containing the worm larvae.

The main danger of transmission to people is eating uncooked or unwashed food containing an infected animal, which can result in the parasite (pictured at left), infecting a person's brain and causing damage that can range from headaches to a rare type of meningitis.

No cases of rat lungworm have been traced to commercial veggies – just plants from home gardens. Avoiding infection is simple. <u>Thoroughly rinse all fruits and vegetables under running water to dislodge any carriers such as tiny slugs.</u> No soap or other solutions are necessary.
