Aloha friends and neighbors,

You may have seen media reports last week about the Department of Education's transportation pilot program that will eventually restore school bus services that were cut last year.

As I learned from the DOE when I visited Waikele School to meet with the Student Leadership Team, this year's pilot is part of a two year plan that will greatly improve service, and, we expect, help the DOE get a better handle on the escalating costs for bus service as the Legislature has insisted.

Kanoelani Elementary is the only school in my district that is included in the pilot at the present time, but the DOE has assured me that problems created by the cuts will be addressed at Waipahu and Mililani Complex schools in the 2014-2015 school year. Data gathered in the first

year will be a big help in making sure the needs of all our public school students and their families who rely on bus service to get to campus are met.

Also of interest to District 18 residents is the status of the **Emergency Services ambulance facility in Waipio**. I have been fighting for funds for a new ambulance base station in this location since I first became a Senator in 2009. Money was appropriated then, but the previous State and City administrations did not act in a timely manner to use the funds. I made sure that \$3.85 million was re-appropriated again this year so that the project can proceed.

Last week I met with Honolulu Mayor Kirk Caldwell to stress the importance of this new ambulance facility to our Central and West Oahu communities, and to urge him to make sure the state funding for this city project is earmarked right away. The Mayor agreed, noting that the Kaiser Clinic in Waipio - where ambulances are currently based - has asked the city to relocate its EMS services. This makes it all the more urgent that the State appropriation be released to the city as soon as possible. As it is planned, the new station will serve as an Emergency Operations Center and home base for an EMS command vehicle, with the second floor intended to be a full backup EMS Communication Center.

I am pleased to report that the Mayor wrote to the Governor immediately to ask that the funds be released. I will also be in touch with the Governor about this critically important project. A new, permanent state-of-the-art ambulance facility will greatly improve emergency response times in our neighborhoods, helping to assure the safety and security of the families in our communities.


National GEARUP Student of the Year ~ Juanito Moises of Waipahu High School!




Juanito Moises, WHS Class of 2014



UH West Oahu is one of the partners in a program that will help research and preserve the former **Honouliuli Internment Camp at Kunia** in Central/West Oahu. U.S. Representative Colleen Hanabusa this month announced that the National Park Service is providing a federal grant of \$111,557 to the Japanese Cultural Center to develop a public awareness program about the history of the camp where as many as 300 Japanese-Americans were detained during World War II.

I was a primary sponsor of last year's bill – now enacted into law – that created an advisory committee to formulate recommendations for an educational resource center at the Honouliuli site so that future generations will know about this important part of Hawaii's WW II history. Along with UH West Oahu and the Japanese Cultural Center, the other organizations in the advisory committee are the State's Historic Preservation Division, the Historic Hawaii Foundation, and current landowner Monsanto Hawaii, which has pledged its support for the project.

For Hale Kula School, a grand renewal begins

Just one look at the photo below will tell you that the groundbreaking for new, expanded facilities at Hale Kula School is a big deal. The school is located on the U.S. Army base at Schofield, and the event attracted members of both the State House and Senate, from the U.S. Senate, leaders of the Schofield military command, and Hawaii Governor Neil Abercrombie.

Hale Kula opened in 1959—the year Hawaii became a state. This will be the first upgrade to the campus since that time. A Federal Department of Defense grant of \$26.6 million is being supplemented by State funding in the amount of \$6.6 million.

The project will result in a new administration building, a two-story classroom building, a student center and library-media center, renovation of existing classrooms, and construction of additional classrooms.






A banner year for Hale Kula's Principal






At the State Capitol . . . Governor Abercrombie has finished his work of signing, vetoing or allowing to pass without signature all bills sent to him from the 2013 Legislative session.

A total of 288 new laws have been enacted. That's about 10 percent of all bills introduced (2,872) which is a bit higher than the usual percentage.

Among the bill signing ceremonies I attended was enactment of **SB 1087**, creating a plan to allow utility customers to finance some renewable energy investments, including solar photovoltaic systems, through a monthly charge on their electric bills. The so-called "on-bill financing" requires some detail work by the Public Utilities Commission, but it is hoped that the program can be ready for consumers sometime early in 2014. consumers early next year.



Visiting Kahoolawe - Moku O Kanaloa

In late May, the Kahoolawe Island Reserve Commission hosted the Aha Moku Advisory Committee and members of the Legislature on an overnight visit to Kahoolawe. *Below right*, I am with **Sen. Gil Kahele.** The visit was an eye-opening experience that adds first-hand knowledge to many of the complex resource decisions with which we lawmakers are faced.



The Aha Moku Advisory Committee (AMAC) was created by the State Legislature in 2012. Its purpose is to advise the Board of Land and Natural Resources on issues related to land and natural resources management through the aha moku system, a system that is based on the indigenous resource management of moku (regional) boundaries. The visit to Kahoolawe was the first official action of the AMAC.
