Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

A few months ago, I reported that funding was available for major improvements to the Roosevelt (Kipapa) Bridge - a major thoroughfare linking Waipahu/Waikele, Waipio and Mililani. A Mililani resident who travels that route on a regular basis remembered that, but he noted, "To date I see/feel no improvement in crossing it six times (or more) a week," and asked, "Any update?"

We are often reminded that the wheels of government sometimes move a little slower than we would like, but I can report that this project is moving forward. The head of the Highways Division at the State Department of Transportation, Ed Sniffen, informed me last week that "The bridge project is currently being advertised for bids, with bid opening scheduled November 9. The Department expects to issue a Notice to Proceed in mid-December with construction work expected to last for about one year."

Keep in mind that improvements to our roads and highways often create temporary detours and inconveniences - but the effort to enhance safety and "drivability" are worth the wait. Stay tuned for progress reports.

The **State Department of Education** has issued its latest measurements of student achievement in island public schools, and youngsters on campuses in Senate District 18 did well - exceeding statewide averages in English Language Arts/Literacy and math and science standards.

The summaries issued earlier this month show Mililani Ike and Mililani Mauka Elementary Schools are among the highest achieving schools in English language arts and mathematics. Mililani Ike is also on the list of top schools that are exceeding state averages for science learning.

The report also notes that Waipio Gentry's **Kanoelani Elementary** is on the list of schools that have showed significant improvements in achievements in English language skills.

We are blessed with dedicated campus administrators and committed teachers at these schools and continue to seek the most effective ways to support their work on behalf of Hawaii's *keiki*. The time between our Legislative sessions is passing quickly. The next Legislature will convene in less than three months as we sort through spending priorities as weighed against available resources. Some attention has been given to a so-called budget "surplus" of \$1 billion. But that big number comes with a caution that this may be an opportunity to meet pressing health, social services and housing needs that have intensified over the last few years.

As always, I encourage you to join the discussion as our session approaches.
