Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

Something a little different this month . . . With support from the State Legislature and literally hundreds of large and small corporate and individual contributions, Hawaii's Public Broadcasting System TV station - PBS Hawaii - has now relocated from the UH Manoa campus to a wonderful new facility on Sand Island Road. During the years I oversaw the Senate's construction budget as Vice Chair of the Committee on Ways and Means, we appropriated a total of \$6.5 million in state support for the new building. I mention this because it was at the dedication and open house for the new facility a few weeks ago that I first heard an inspiring story about a retired public school teacher and Waipahu native who played a part in finishing the building.

Here's the heartwarming story as told by PBS Hawaii President Leslie Wilcox, pictured below with a photo of Karen Sueko Okada Watanabe.

Karen was the youngest of a half-dozen children and was raised in Waipahu where her father was a watchmaker and her mother was a homemaker. Money was limited and traditionally girls in the family did not continue their education. But Karen's only brother asked that she be allowed to attend the University of Hawaii and the family sacrificed to send her off to college.



She graduated from the UH College of Education and taught in public elementary schools in Central Oahu and on Hawaii Island, spending the last 15 years of her career at Manoa Elementary.

Karen married a fellow teacher who was teaching at Waipahu High School. They had no children; Karen was a devoted caregiver to her husband as he was treated for cancer. In retirement, she lived in a small Nuuanu condo where she tended to things that were important to her - personal finance, personal independence and lifelong education. She loved studying stocks and bonds and amassed a myriad of financial assets. She did her own income taxes and was very precise, a perfectionist. She did not drive a car, instead walking, or catching TheBus or a taxi everywhere she needed to go. She took pride in the fact that she could take care of herself. PBS Hawaii was by far her favorite TV station.

Karen died last fall at age 89. She left bequests to several nonprofit organizations, including PBS Hawaii. Her gift of \$650,000 to the TV station took us over the top to surpass the \$30 million fundraising goal.

WIS is now the largest single track intermediate / middle school in the islands, academic home to 1,300 proud students each year.



• Early walk-in voting locations opened this week at Kapolei Hale and Honolulu Hale. Registered voters may cast their ballots Monday through Friday 8 am – 4 pm until Friday, November 5.



- If you are not yet registered to vote, it's not too late. Effective this year, qualified Hawaii residents may register in-person at walk-in voting sites.
- Mail-in ballots were sent last week to voters who requested them. It's still possible to request a mail-in ballot until Tuesday, November 1.
- On Tuesday, November 8 General Election Day polling places are open statewide from 7 am 6 pm.
