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2018—Vear of the Dog Lung Hee Lat Choy!

Aloha, friends and neighbors,

We learned late last week that the U.S. Department of Education has approved Hawaii's state plan for the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). During most of 2017, I was a member of one of the working groups that helped to articulate the plan that aims to give the state and campus leadership more authority to formulate policy and "localize" the way teachers teach, and students learn.

That's good news for principals and teachers. They know their campuses and students best and will now have a greater say in how teaching and learning are put into practice in their schools. That makes it all the more important that we work toward the goal of placing qualified and licensed teachers in all of our classrooms.

We made some progress on that goal in the past year. It is always gratifying to see the tangible results of my legislative work, especially when those results happen quickly. I came up with a new approach to dealing with the critical shortage of qualified, licensed teachers for our public school classrooms, especially at hard-to-staff campuses. I wanted to support folks already in the DOE system - Substitute Teachers, Emergency Hires and Education Assistants - who were ready to take a next step and earn their teacher licenses. I pushed for scholarship funds which were allocated in the budget we approved in the 2017 legislative session, and the College of Education under Dean Donald Young moved quickly to develop an online and after-hours class schedule to accommodate these working professionals.

Earlier this month, I was on the UH Manoa campus for orientation of the first group of more than 50 individuals who enrolled in the *Grow Our Own* program. It was an emotional and heartwarming moment – not only for me, but also for the new students. Many of them approached me, some with tears in their eyes, to let me know that they were so grateful for this opportunity for professional improvement. I could feel their passion for education, and for the students in their schools and classrooms, and I am so pleased to have been a part of this innovative approach to increasing and improving our corps of dedicated teachers.

I should note that in this first group of teacher-students seven are from the Mililani/Waipahu area. The College of Education says there is already a waiting list for the next group's sessions. I plan to aggressively advocate for additional funding to support the *Grow Our Own* initiative.



The Second Regular Session of the 29th Hawaii State Legislature convened on Wednesday, January 17. Our 60 working-day session will continue through the first week of May as we focus on the spending plan for the second year of the two-year budget we approved last year.

Hearings on supplemental budget requests have been underway since December and additional testimony will be presented as we consider specific bills that have been introduced.

Below are brief summaries of some of the bills I have introduced in line with my focus on public education from pre-school through college.

The opening of the Legislative session coincided with the 125th anniversary of the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian monarchy, and thousands gathered during the day at `Iolani Palace and the State Capitol to commemorate those events.

I am among eleven members of the Senate and House of Representatives who are proud of our Native Hawaiian ethnicity who were on stage during a formal program in the Capitol rotunda.

The opening of the legislative session and the commemorative events were an appropriate time to re-commit to a unity of purpose that should guide our government's work on behalf of all Hawaii citizens.

Here are some of the bills I have introduced to support public education:

- ♦ Bills that would transfer public school lands from the City & County of Honolulu and the Department of Land and Natural Resources to the DOE and give the DOE authority to sell, exchange or lease those lands
- Bills that appropriate funds to cover expenses for public school students from low-income families for such things as fees
 for SAT and ACT tests, and the costs of technical and workforce training programs
- ♦ A bill that would allow school principals the authority to enter into contracts for goods, services and construction valued at less than \$25,000
- ♦ A bill to officially establish a Farm-to-School program with DOE support staff
- A bill requiring the state to inventory unused facilities for possible use by Public Charter Schools
- A bill expanding membership of the Board of Education to include a teacher
- A bill authorizing small amounts in unclaimed property accounts to be deposited into a libraries special fund if unclaimed after five years
- ♦ A bill to establish a STEM educator scholarship program to address the shortage of STEM teachers in secondary schools
