Aloha friends and neighbors:

The deadline for acting on bills passed by the Legislature in the 2018 session has now passed. There were 2,260 bills introduced this year. About ten percent of them - 229 bills - were given final approval by the Senate and House, and 212 of those bills were signed into law. In addition, 8 bills became law without a signature, and another eight bills were vetoed. The remaining bill, SB 2922, is a proposed Constitutional Amendment that needs no signature - it goes directly to the General Election ballot to be voted on by the people.

Unfortunately, one of the bills vetoed by the Governor was my Senate Bill 2919 that would have benefited our public libraries. The bill proposed a pilot program to allow the State Library System to explore the lease of unused library lands to generate revenues to support public libraries. An example of such properties is the now-unused former site of the Aiea Public Library.

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I wanted to find ways to help the libraries expand their services by, for example, cultivating public-private partnerships to make best use of these lands and provide a sustainable source of revenues.

The Governor, in his veto message, indicated he didn't think this was something the library system should be involved in, preferring instead a return of unused lands to the Department of Land & Natural Resources. Our libraries need and deserve additional support, and this bill - which easily passed both the Senate and House - was a creative proposal to generate additional funding.

This summer, we have had numerous opportunities to celebrate our Mililani and Waipio neighbors. I hope you will enjoy some of the captured memories in this newsletter.

Primary Election Day Saturday, August 11

General Election Day Tuesday, November 6 Hawaii's primary election day is just a couple of weeks away – with walk-in voting at polling stations from 7 am – 6 pm on Saturday, August 11.

Many Hawaii voters have chosen to vote by mail-in "absentee" ballots, even though they won't be out of town on election day. The Office of Elections notes that 62 percent of those who voted in the 2016 primary did so by mail-in ballot or at early walk-in polling stations – and that percentage is expected to be higher this year.

If you have requested a mail-in ballot, you should have received it by now. It must be returned by 6 pm August 11 for your vote to be counted. If you wish to request a mail-in ballot, you may still do so until Saturday, August 4 – one week before election day.

It is also possible to vote before primary day at walk-in voting sites set up at **Kapolei Hale** in **West Oahu or downtown at Honolulu Hale**. Those sites will be open for voters through Thursday, August 9.

**NOT REGISTERED TO VOTE?** Hawaii law has been changed to allow registration at polling places same-day on election day. Be sure you have appropriate identification (driver license & Social Security number) if you do this - then you will be allowed to cast your ballot.
