APRIL 2022 - Serving Mililani Town, Waipio Gentry, Waikele, Village Park & Royal Kunia

Aloha Friends and Neighbors,

Since the reopening of the Capitol, we have received an influx of visitors to our offices. After two years being closed to the public, it has been wonderful to see friendly faces stopping by to share their insights or say hello. The month of April also meant the return of annual traditions like Purple Up Day (supporting and celebrating military youth in our public schools), and the Women's Legislative Caucus' Easter Basket Drive.

I was happy to once again participate in community events such as Read to Me International at Bishop Museum, as well as the Rotary Club of Mililani Sunrise's Peace Pole Dedication. We are in the final stretch of the 2022 session with a busy week of conference committee hearings and lots of updates on the horizon. I am eager to see how things unfold and am hopeful that we will see positive changes thanks to a number of important bills. Here are a list of my priority bills that are currently in conference committee:

SB2819: RELATING TO TEACHER COMPENSATION – This bill would address the long-standing issue around teacher salary compression that has resulted in many veteran teachers leaving the profession and hurting our ability to retain our highly-qualified teachers. Over the years, teachers have absorbed multiple flat contracts as the State weathered economic downturns, resulting in many senior teachers not receiving pay increases. SB2819 will seek to correct this with a \$93M appropriation for teachers whose salaries have not changed since reaching the top of their pay classifications. We would also remove their classifications from the statue to allow HSTA to negotiate all compensation for teachers.

SB2821: RELATING TO MENSTRUAL EQUITY – As I've shared before (and detail further in this issue), this is an incredibly important issue for students nationwide and which has garnered amazing support from our community. This bill requires menstrual products to be provided free of charge for all HIDOE students. I look forward to passing this important legislation to provide our students the support they need to attend school comfortably and have equal access to necessary health supplies during menstrual periods.

HB2510: RELATING TO INCOME – The economic toll of the pandemic and recent price increases have added extreme additional stress to many local families. These concerns require greater support to provide more economic stability for working residents, especially low-income households with children who are struggling to meet their basic needs. The State has been long overdue in providing wage and tax policies to benefit working families by addressing minimum wage. This bill will incrementally increase the State's minimum wage to \$12/hr beginning October 1, 2022; \$15/hr beginning January 1, 2024; and \$18/hr beginning January 1, 2026.

<u>HB510: RELATING TO TAXATION</u> – The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) bill takes the existing non-refundable EITC which decreases your tax liability and makes it refundable so the balance is returned back to you as part of your tax refund. As a result, more money will be placed into the hands of our hard-working families. It is important to remember that this tax credit is called the "earned income" tax credit because only those who work and earn income qualify.

HB2471: RELATING TO ADEQUATE RESERVE FUND – This bill temporarily amends the amount required in the reserve fund for unemployment insurance. Because this fund is paid for entirely by employers without adjustment, the cost to our small and local businesses would be tremendous after the payouts from the pandemic. Advancing this legislation is a way to protect small and local businesses from absorbing astronomical increases in their unemployment contributions.

HB2424: RELATING TO CHILD WELFARE SERVICES – This bill addresses the need for increased power by the Department of Human Services to review and investigate families that receive benefits through the State's adoption program, as well as to investigate against individuals whom a post-adoption complaint has been made. It is intended to increase crisis support for youth, including helping families establish long-term community and mental health support for foster care youth, foster parents as well as provide additional resources to ensure successful transitions for children and families.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION BUDGET:

We have made considerable strides in the past year after the budget challenges we faced throughout the pandemic. I am happy to share that the Senate has proposed a significant increase into the Department of Education (DOE) budget, which will have a tremendous impact on schools throughout the state. Here are some highlights from the current DOE budget breakdown:

- -- \$3M in renovations and equipment for the Waipahu HS Academic Heath Center
- -- \$3M for increased security at campuses throughout the state
- -- \$6M to increase statewide opportunities for Agricultural Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs (including Mililani High School) through the construction of automated greenhouses
- -- \$1M to address costs associated with menstrual equity and provide statewide health supplies
- -- \$9.3M to Mililani High School for CTE equipment and facilities

MENSTRUAL EQUITY SUPPORT



April 1st was a momentous day at the Capitol, when three of my priority bills were heard and passed out of Finance. One in particular was especially moving to witness, as **SB2821 RELATING TO MENSTRUAL EQUALITY** passed. This bill requires menstrual products to be provided free of charge for all students at every campus--a long, overdue journey to ending period poverty in Hawai'i's schools. HIDOE FREE SUMMER LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Free DOE summer programs and meals will be offered to support Hawai'i's public school students, especially for those impacted by disruptions due to the pandemic. Offerings will include: official summer school courses, school learning hubs for specialized student support, accelerated learning, as well as college, career and community learning (including internships). Priority enrolllment will be given to students two or more grade levels below English and/or math, high school students not on track to graduate (especially seniors), fourth graders who did not meet grade 3 proficiency, K-2 students unable to attend school in person due to the pandemic, and students in transition grades.
