

RAIL'S REINVENTION OF KALIHI

How will the rail change the complexion of Kalihi as it rolls through Dillingham Blvd? That was the focus of a Skyline Summit today. About a hundred community, business, and government leaders discussed a vision for Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) to create a livable urban neighborhood.

Kamehameha Schools plans to add approximately 5,000 units of mixed-use housing and build a creative hub called Kānaka. There was talk about turning Kapālama Canal into a potential recreational space.
