The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) provides incentive funds to state child support enforcement agencies that perform well in certain categories established by DHHS. In the past, DHHS additionally provided two dollars of matching funds for every dollar of incentive funds that a state earned and spent, but at the end of federal fiscal year 2006-2007, Congress eliminated the additional matching funds. The present ARRA program temporarily restores the matching funds. These ARRA matching funds can be used for any legitimate expenditure to support the state child support enforcement program.

> A Special Condition of VAWA grants limits the amount of funds that a state can obligate before the U.S. Office for Violence Against Women (OVW) approves the state's Implementation Plan. The Department received notice of this grant award on May 15, 2009, and submitted the Implementation Plan to OVW for approval on July 6, 2009, but did not receive approval until October 29, 2009. This caused a delay in implementing the award.

Pursuant to federal requirements, sub-grants for this program must be allocated as follows:

- at least 5% for State and local courts, including juvenile courts
- at least 25% for law enforcement
- at least 25% for prosecutors
- at least 30% for nonprofit, nongovernmental victim service providers, of which at least 10% for culturally-specific community-based organizations
- up to 15% may be awarded in any of these areas at the Department's discretion

In 2010, the Department received seventeen sub-grant applications, and awarded thirteen sub-grants. The other four applications did not meet the requirements of this program. As of June 30, 2010, a balance of \$141,598 in grant funds remains to be sub-granted. Of this amount, \$52,496 must be awarded to victim service providers (the Department will conduct another solicitation for sub-grant applications in August 2010), and \$89,102 may be awarded at the Department's discretion (the Department is working to allocate these funds in August 2010 to county and state agencies that have demonstrated a need for these funds to address domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking crimes).
