- 1 **EOA's Position:** The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department
- 2 of Health, supports this measure, provided that its enactment does not reduce or replace priorities
- 3 within the Administration's budget request.
- 4 **Fiscal Implications:** This measure appropriates funds in the amount of \$1,710,000 for FY18 for
- 5 the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC).
- 6 **Purpose and Justification:** EOA notes that the appropriation in this bill is a priority of the Ige
- 7 Administration. Governor Ige's budget request proposes an increase of \$1,710,000 for EOA's
- 8 base budget for ADRC bringing the total to \$3,100,000. The ADRC helps individuals and their
- 9 families identify their long-term services and support needs based on a person centered process,
- understand options including the publicly funded services such as Kupuna Care, and develop and

- 1 implement a comprehensive support plan. The request for an additional \$1.7 million will build
- 2 capacity for EOA and the four county based Area Agencies on Aging to operate their ADRC
- 3 sites, to implement and sustain statewide fully functional status in accordance with federal
- 4 requirements, and integrate participant directed supports as a function of the ADRC. During
- 5 SFY 2016, a total of 24,537 calls were made to the ADRC statewide, an 18% increase in call
- 6 from SFY2015. The ADRC linked 7,254 older adults to publicly funded (federal and state) long
- 7 term services and supports.
- 8 Without the additional ADRC funds, the ADRC sites will not be able to maintain fully functional
- 9 status, manage the anticipated increase in the volume of calls to the ADRC sites, or take on
- additional responsibilities being considered on today's agenda, such as implementation of the
- 11 Kupuna Caregiver program as described in SB0534.
- 12 **Recommendation:** EOA favors an increase in the base budget for ADRC, but humbly requests
- that SB0533 be advanced in the event that supplemental funding is necessary.

SUBJECT: SB 533 – Making an Appropriation for the Aging and Disability Resource Center.

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD) **SUPPORTS SB 533.** The purpose of the bill is to provide funding to support the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC).

The Council was a member of the State ADRC Advisory Board back in April 2006, as a result of the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) receiving a Federal grant to embark on establishing a one-stop single entry point for older adults and persons with disabilities. Since then, the project has established a one-stop center on the Islands of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui, and is in the process of developing the Honolulu site. The Council has a Memorandum of Agreement between the Hawaii County Office of Aging, ADRC, which defines the partner roles and responsibilities related to services provided by ADRC and the Council.

As a systems advocacy agency responsible for statewide planning, coordination, monitoring, evaluation, and advocacy on behalf of individuals with DD and their families, we support a streamlined and user-friendly process for older adults and individuals with disabilities to receive information and be able to navigate the service system to access services and supports. The Council, as well as individuals with disabilities, advocates, public and private service providers, and other stakeholders, need to be continually involved with the planning and implementation of the ADRCs. We believe identifying and engaging partnerships with all stakeholders will contribute to a seamless approach of accessing long-term services and supports in a manner that respects individual choice and desire, is person-centered, promotes independence and dignity, and provides individual control over the person's life.

## SB 533 MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTER

**MCOA's Position:** Maui County Office on Aging (MCOA) is in **strong support** of SB 533 that appropriates funds for the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC).

Purpose and Justification: Census projections indicate that the senior population in Hawaii will almost double between the period between 2010 and 2020 with the highest percentage increase occurring in those over the age of 85. In order to minimize the potential financial strain of the burgeoning aging population on the State, proactive efforts are required now. *Keeping seniors healthy and at home is the most cost-effective manner* to address the needs of one of our most valuable societal resources, and SB 533 will ensure that state funds are utilized to provide assistance in the community at a much lesser financial drain than institutional services.

Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC): Implemented on Maui on April 16, 2012, the ADRC has allowed MCOA to improve efficiency and effectiveness in working with elders and family caregivers across a broad spectrum of functional abilities and financial standing. The ADRC is designed to serve as a highly visible and trusted resource agency where people with disabilities of all ages can find information on the full range of long-term support options and can access a single point of entry to public long-term support programs and benefits. Benefits of the ADRC include but are not limited to:

- Efficient Screening and Referral: The HI ADRC Intake process provides a concise indication of individual functional needs supports as well as personal resources available to assist in meeting functional needs.
- Better care for seniors and ease of access for family caregivers: The ADRC is
  designed to serve as a highly visible and trusted resource agency where people
  with disabilities of all ages can find information on the full range of long-term
  support options and can access a single point of entry to public long-term support
  programs and benefits.
- Comprehensive individualized interventions: The HI ADRC Assessment Tool provides in-depth information regarding individual circumstances, needs, and appropriate interventions in twenty-seven (27) Clinical Assessment Protocols (CAPS). When a CAP is "triggered," there is a clear indication not only that assistance is likely needed, but also what type of intervention is most appropriate. For instance, if the Falls CAP is triggered, MCOA staff can determine the likely reason for the risk for a fall and speak with the elder and/or family member regarding appropriate interventions. If the risk of fall is most likely due to poor lighting, for instance, a plan to increase light in poorly illuminated areas would result. Prior to the ADRC tool implementation, MCOA knew that seniors in general were at risk for falls, but we had no way to clearly identify which senior risked a fall and what intervention would most likely result in reducing that risk of a fall. This type of data allows MCOA to better focus interventions. In short, the ADRC Assessment tools allow MCOA personnel to

effectively target interventions resulting in a much more efficient use of public funds.

- Increased AAA capacity to target services to those most at need: Through the Intake and Assessment process, MCOA gathers functional and financial data that assists employees in effectively and efficiently identifying those individuals who demonstrate the greatest need. The HI ADRC Assessment process allows the identification of those individuals at the lowest income and highest risk. The Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended in 2006, tasks Area Agencies on Aging to target services to older individuals with: greatest economic need; greatest social need; those at risk for institutional placement; low-income minority older individuals; older individuals with limited English proficiency; and older individuals residing in rural areas. The ADRC tools allow us to easily comply with this federal requirement and thereby utilize public funds in the most efficient manner.
- Ease of access to Quality Improvement Information: Through the ADRC information system, MCOA now has a means to track the actual success of services in helping seniors remain at home. For example, the Assessment tool identifies those individuals who have a CAPS trigger for Institutional Risk. AAAs using the ADRC system can now quantify the number of individuals who continue to live in the community through support of home and community-based services. This ability to objectively quantify the effectiveness of service delivery in order to ensure the best use of public funds has not been present in Hawaii previously.

Catholic Charities Hawai'i (CCH) is a tax exempt, non-profit agency that has been providing supportive home and community based services to elders since 1973 and currently serves over 4,000 older persons each year.

**CCH supports SB 533,** to provide funding for the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC).

Aging & Disability Resource Centers (ADRC's) are being developed to serve as single entry points for individuals who need information about long term support services. The role of the ADRC's is critical, especially as they serve as the sole entry point to become eligible to receive Kupuna Care services.

Catholic Charities Hawai'i is a current provider of Kupuna Care transportation and homemaker services for frail elders. Both of these services require that elders must be assessed and authorized through the Honolulu ADRC in order to initiate or continue services. Catholic Charities Hawaii supports funding for the ADRCs in order to help them continue to work toward effectively meeting the needs of kupuna and their caregivers.

## Catholic Charities Hawai`i supports funding of \$1.71M for Aging & Disability Resource Centers.

- We recommend that some of the funding from SB 533 be used for additional training of ADRC staff so that they may continue to improve their skills and knowledge to help them in conducting assessments and referrals.
- We also hope that an informational briefing will be scheduled for the Executive Office on Aging's report to the Legislature, "Pursuant to HB 1878, Act 138 Requiring the Executive Office on Aging to Evaluate the Effectiveness of the Aging and Disability Resource Centers in Each County and to Report on the Implementation of the Federal No

- The same amount of funding would only pay for nursing home care for  $\underline{13}$  individuals.

Good afternoon, Chairs Baker and Green, Vice Chairs Nishihara and Chang, and members of the Commerce, Consumer Protection & Health, and Human Services Committees.

Lanakila Pacific supports <u>SB 533</u> to fund the Aging and Disability Resource Center which provides kupuna and individuals with disabilities with a single point of entry for information and long-term care options. The Honolulu ADRC, which was operationalized less than two years ago, continues to build capacity. Funding is necessary to fully realize the growing demand for services, and to provide training for the staff to deal with the increasingly complex needs of the senior population.

The Executive Office on Aging submitted its report on the effectiveness of the ADRCs in each county. A briefing on the data and its analysis would be helpful in understanding the areas in need of improvement.

Lanakila Pacific has served Hawaii's communities for over 77-years. As an Aging and Disability Resource Center service provider, Lanakila Meals on Wheels served more than 2,500 Hawaii kupuna last year. More than 45% of the kupuna who responded to our 2016 survey reported the meal they received from Lanakila Meals on Wheels was the only meal they ate that day. More than 50% reported our staff or volunteer was the only person they saw that day.

With the anticipated growth and demand to care for Hawaii's kupuna, we urge you to advance SB 535. Thank you for your consideration.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony in support for SB533, requesting continued funding for the Aging and Disability Resource Center. I strongly support this bill and would appreciate your support.

It is very difficult to find the right source of help in the community when you need it. Our kupuna, disabled and family caregivers may not be able to "surf the internet" to find the support and services they may need. A single source of information is best for providing information on long-term care options.

My name is Barbara Dove and I am a concerned resident of Hawaii. Although I have lived in Hawaii over 20 years, I wouldn't know where to start looking for information about long-term care options. I am comfortable using the internet to do research, but it would be great to know there is one resource center, supported by the State of Hawaii, that could give me the best and most current information. It can be overwhelming "surfing the net" and you just don't know what organization or company you may be looking at from a fraud prospective. Continuing to have a State of Hawaii resource center would be must more beneficial and reassuring.
