TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION

The original version of this bill SB560 proposed to appropriate \$25,000.00 for the current fiscal year, and an additional \$25,000 for the following fiscal year, for the University of Hawaii to translate the Hawaii state constitution into the Hawaiian language.

Apparently that \$50,000 was either not enough money, or else the project might be put out to bid in hopes of getting a lower price —

because the number of dollars to be appropriated has been left blank. Also it seems that there is hope that the bidding frenzy among competing translator contractors can be sorted out out soon after January 7, 2059. Is it really going to take that long? It would not be surprising, considering how slowly our government bureaucrats work.

Come on, folks, it should not be necessary to appropriate any money to get the State Constitution translated into Hawaiian language.

How many millions of dollars have already been spent to establish programs at the University of Hawaii whose purpose is to produce students who are fluent in Hawaiian language at all levels of expertise from bachelors to doctoral degrees?

Surely the professors of Hawaiian language could find students in their classes who would be capable and willing to do the translation for free. Students might work as individuals in competition with each other to see whose translation is best. Or the translation job might be done as a class project with students working together cooperatively on a portion of the constitution each week until the entire document has been translated.

Similar projects have been done where students translate articles in the Hawaiian language newspapers from the 1800s into English; so why not have students translate the English language state constitution into Hawaiian?

Not every good thing requires an appropriation of taxpayer dollars. Furthermore, if money were actually necessary to do this project, then the first place to look for the money should be OHA or Kamehameha Schools.

TESTIMONY IN <u>SUPPORT</u> OF SB 560

Appropriates funds to the University of Hawai'i to translate the Hawai'i state constitution into the Hawaiian language.

Representative Kaniela Ing, Vice-Chair Representative Cedric Asuega Gates and members of the committee, my name is Shelley Soong, and am a student and staff member of the University of Hawai'i. I wish to submit this testimony in strong support of SB 560. This bill would provide adequate resources to translate the Hawai'i state constitution into the Hawaiian language.

I support this bill for numerous reasons:

- Since 1978, Article 15, Section 4 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i has stated that <u>"English and Hawaiian shall be the official languages of Hawai'i."</u> It's been almost 40 years since Hawaiian has been an official language of Hawai'i, however, the State of Hawai'i does not make available government records, papers or documents in the Hawaiian language.
- Since 1978, Article 10, Section 4 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii has stated that, "The <u>State shall promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history and language</u>." Despite this, the State of Hawaii does not make available opportunities for Hawaiian language speakers to use the language. Official government publications and documents to be available in the Hawaiian language will give the public the opportunity to use the Hawaiian language.
- In 2016 according to the Hawaii State Data Center, <u>Hawaiian is the #1 language other than</u> <u>English spoken at home in Hawaii County</u>. In the State of Hawaii as a whole, Hawaiian is <u>among the top 5 languages other than English spoken at home</u>. Hawaiian is spoken by thousands of State of Hawaii residents, and this amount is increasing. More opportunities need to be made to ensure that the language is promoted in the state.
- Over the past 40 years, various educational institutions in the State of Hawaii have not only expanded, but some have reached exceptional international recognition for promoting the Hawaiian language:
 - In 2014, 'Aha Pūnana Leo (educational organization in Hawaii) was awarded the world's first accreditation of an early education program conducted through an endangered and indigenous language by the World Indigenous Nations Higher Education Consortium (WINHEC). 'Aha Pūnana Leo continues its success in increasing the number of fluent speakers of the Hawaiian language in the State of Hawaii.
 - The Hawaii State Department of Education continues to provide K-12 Hawaiian language education through the public school system.
 - The University of Hawaii (UH) offers successful Hawaiian language programs at all 10 campuses across 4 Hawaiian Islands. This has given State of Hawaii adult residents

opportunities to successfully learn the Hawaiian language and become fluent speakers of the language.

- UH offers bachelor's, masters and doctoral degrees in Hawaiian language. These degree programs have allowed for an increase in the number of individuals with advanced degrees focused on the Hawaiian language.
- The State of Hawaii is investing a vast amount of resources to increase the number of Hawaiian language students and fluent speakers in Hawaii; more needs to be done to ensure that those who acquire and speak the language are not acquiring an impractical skill.
