### In consideration of HOUSE BILL 754 RELATING TO THE STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION DIVISION

House Bill 754 proposes to appropriate \$800,000 for the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 for the digitization of the library of the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) in the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department). The Department supports this measure provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Budget request and offers comments.

The Department appreciates the Legislature's past support for SHPD's efforts to digitize its library, archives, and decision records. The Department appreciates the Legislature's continuing support for digitization of SHPD's records. These records are essential to the protection of Hawaii's cultural heritage, and as tools for planners, consultants and SHPD staff to use in identifying known historic, archaeological, cultural, burials sites, and making reasonable decisions about how they can be considered in project planning. SHPD estimates that there are now over 4 million pages in SHPD files and library. About 40% have been digitized so far.

The Department has no amendments to recommend to this measure but notes that the appropriation amounts in House Bill 754 SECTION 2 add up to \$1.1 million, where SECTION 1 states that the appropriation is to be \$800,000.

The Department greatly appreciates the high level of funding suggested in this measure and recognizes that, if appropriated, final funding will be the result of the Legislature's review of an adoption of the Executive Branch budget. The Department notes that appropriation for this purpose that is much greater than \$200,000 per annum will be problematic for SHPD to manage with existing staff.

On behalf of Historic Hawai'i Foundation (HHF), I am writing with **support for HB 754.** The bill provides funds to the Historic Preservation Division of the Department of Land and Natural Resources for the digitization of the SHPD library and for additional operations.

HHF encourages the digitization of historic preservation records through a project to digitize paper reports, maps, inventories, determinations and correspondence, and other materials.

The project is needed to make records available for both staff and public researchers. A comprehensive, digitally-based and integrated data management system will assist the department with more efficient management of its cases, provide better information and service to the public, support preservation projects, and assist the department to retain compliance with provisions of the federal historic preservation grant to the state.
