The Hawai'i State AFL-CIO is a state federation of 74 affiliate local unions and councils with over 68,000 members across both public and private sectors. We appreciate the opportunity to testify in **support** of H.R. 143 / H.C.R. 141.

Out of state maritime academies currently supply Hawai'i's maritime workforce needs. Creating a maritime career pathway from cradle to career will build Hawai'i's capacity to continue the seamless delivery of readily available goods in Hawai'i by Hawai'i workers. Hawai'i maritime workers are Hawai'i taxpayers whose income is part of Hawai'i's economy even while they are out to sea.

Maritime workers in Hawai'i must currently leave the state for maritime training in both licensed and unlicensed maritime career pathways. Establishing a maritime college in Hawai'i will enable Hawai'i to fulfill its own maritime workforce needs with students directly out of high school or with adults who are changing careers. The maritime college will also fulfill the need for ongoing professional development for both in-state and out-of-state mariners.

We appreciate your consideration of our testimony in support of H.R. 143 / H.C.R. 141.
