## in consideration of SENATE BILL 2659, SD 1 RELATING TO REGENERATIVE TOURISM

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Moriwaki, and Members of the Committee on Ways and Means:

The Office of Planning and Sustainable Development (OPSD) <u>supports</u> S.B. 2659, SD 1 which amends Chapter 226, HRS, the Hawai'i State Planning Act, by adding to Section 226-8, Objectives and Policies for the Economy – Visitor Industry, subsection (b)(5) and new subsections (b) (9) - (18) to incorporate a regenerative framework for the visitor industry.

SB 2659, SD 1 requires an update to the State Tourism Functional Plan in coordination with the Office of Planning and Sustainable Development be submitted to the 2025 Regular Session of the Legislature.

OPSD supports this measure and offers its cooperation to the Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA), pursuant to §§ 226-55 and -56, HRS. The OPSD notes that the recent Destination Management Action Plan (DMAP) process and on-going implementation actions being supported by the HTA staff and community investments are consistent with this measure.
