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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PROTECTIVE ORDERS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Chapter 28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read
as follows:

4 HAWAII HOPE CARD PROGRAM "PART 5 §28-Hawaii hope card program. (a) There is 6 established within the department of the attorney general a 7 program to be known as the Hawaii hope card program, which shall 8 be responsible for issuing hope cards to holders of a long term 9 protective order to allow law enforcement to quickly verify the 10 existence of the long term protective order and easily obtain 11 information regarding the long term protective order.

(b) A hope card may be requested by any person who has been granted a long term protective order issued by a Hawaii court, Federal court, or other court of competent jurisdiction by submitting an application to the department of the attorney general in a form prescribed by the department of the attorney general. Upon determining that the long term protective order

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1 granted under chapter 586 that is effective for a period 2 exceeding one hundred eighty days. 3 For purposes of this part, "other court of competent (f) 4 jurisdiction" shall mean a court of a country that: 5 (1)Is a party to the Hague Convention of 5 October 1961 Abolishing the Requirement of Legalisation for Foreign 6 7 Public Documents; and 8 (2) Has enacted laws or established procedures for the 9 issuance and enforcement of permanent restraining 10 orders that are substantially similar to those in this 11 State. 12 §28-Access to Hawaii hope card program information; 13 verification. (a) The department of the attorney general shall 14 maintain a database of all hope cards issued by the Hawaii hope 15 card program and their related long term protective orders. The 16 records may be incorporated as part of the current Hawaii 17 criminal justice center protective order databases, records, or 18 both. Law enforcement personnel may access the database or the 19 National Crime Information Center-Protection Order File database 20 to verify the existence and scope of a long term protective 21 order.

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1 (b) Access to the database by internet and telephone shall 2 be provided twenty-four hours a day, seven days per week for the 3 duration of the long term protective order, for which the 4 department of the attorney general shall maintain a Hawaii phone 5 number; provided that the identity of the applicant shall not be 6 listed where the long term protective order has been obtained 7 under section 604-10.5(e). 8 Public access authorized by this section may be (c) 9 provided in coordination with the Hawaii criminal justice data 10 center established under chapter 846. 11 §28-External agencies; funding. The department of the 12 attorney general may work with outside agencies, local, state, 13 and federal governments and accept gifts, donations, and grants 14 from public agencies and private persons to support the program. 15 §28-Reporting requirements. The department of the 16 attorney general shall submit a report to the legislature no 17 later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular 18 session to provide a report on the activities and status of the 19 hope card program."

20 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 22 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016, for the HB58 HD1 HMS 2015-1901-1

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1	department of the attorney general to establish and administer
2	the Hawaii hope card program including the hiring of staff.
3	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
4	of the attorney general for the purposes of this Act.
5	SECTION 3. The department of the attorney general shall
6	develop and implement the Hawaii hope card program established
7	by section 1 of this Act no later than January 1, 2016.
8	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2015.
