A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KUPUNA CARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State must find
 new ways to accommodate a broader range of home- and communitybased long-term care options for Hawaii's rapidly growing
- 4 elderly population. According to 2015 population data from the
- 5 department of business, economic development, and tourism, there
- 6 are 236,914 persons, or 16.5 per cent of the population, 65
- 7 years and older in Hawaii. The percentage of this population is
- 8 projected to rise to 19.4 per cent by 2020 and 23 per cent by
- 9 2030.
- 10 The legislature further finds that family caregivers play a
- 11 major role in the State's health care system by providing long-
- 12 term care to the elderly. According to AARP, there are 154,000
- 13 unpaid family caregivers in Hawaii, with the average caregiver
- 14 being a 62-year-old married woman who cares for an elderly
- 15 parent or husband while still working. Caregiving for an
- 16 elderly family member takes a toll on caregivers, and care
- 17 recipients often worry they will become a burden on family

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1	members. Numerous studies show that caregivers report higher
2	levels of psychological distress, and caring for elderly family
3	members over extended periods of time without compensation can
4	lead to chronic stress. In some instances, adult children who
5	work on the mainland may have to return home to live, and
6	abandon careers in the process, in order to care for their
7	parents at home, because it is the only alternative to expensive
8	institutional care. If children already live in Hawaii, they
9	often have to quit their jobs to stay home to care for aging
10	parents, which may result in financial disaster for the family
11	and a loss of tax revenue for the State. While caregivers play
12	a critical role in helping others, it is imperative that
13	caregivers take care of themselves and have the necessary
14	support and services to sustain their own health as well as the
15	health of the family member for which they are caring.
16	The purpose of this Act is to:

(1) Direct the executive office on aging to establish the

kupuna caregivers program to assist community members

in obtaining care for elders while remaining in the



workforce;

1	(2)	Clarify the kupuna services and supports provided by
2		area agencies on aging within the kupuna care program
3		and make establishment of the kupuna care program
4		mandatory; and
5	(3)	Appropriate funds for the establishment and
6		implementation of the kupuna caregivers program;
7		provided that it is the intent of the legislature that
8		the kupuna caregivers program be established
9		regardless of the availability of state funding, in
10		order to enable area agencies on aging to take
11		advantage of other moneys that may be available to
12		assist caregivers to remain in the workforce.
13	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended by	y adding two new sections to part II to be
15	appropriat	tely designated and to read as follows:
16	" <u>§34</u>	9-A Definitions. Unless the context clearly requires
17	a differe	nt meaning, when used in this part:
18	"Act:	ivities of daily living" means the following activities
19	that indiv	viduals perform as a part of daily living: eating,
20	dressing,	bathing, toileting, transferring in and out of a bed
21	or chair,	and walking.

1	"Adult day care" or "adult day health" means personal care
2	for dependent elders in a supervised, protective, and congregate
3	setting during some portion of a day. Services offered in
4	conjunction with adult day care or adult day health typically
5	include social and recreational activities, training,
6	counseling, and services such as rehabilitation, medication
7	assistance, and home health aide services for adult day health.
8	"Aging and disability resource centers" means an entity
9	established by the State as part of the state system of long-
10	term care, serving as a highly visible and trusted source where
11	people of all incomes and ages can get information on the full
12	range of long-term support options, and a single point of entry
13	for access to public long-term support programs and benefits.
14	"Area agency on aging" means an agency designated by the
15	executive office on aging to develop and administer the area
16	plan for a comprehensive and coordinated system of aging
17	services
18	"Assisted transportation" means assistance and
19	transportation, including escort, for a person who has cognitive
20	or physical difficulties using regular vehicular transportation.

1	"Attendan	t care" means stand-by assistance, supervision, or
2	cues, includin	g verbal prompts for medication, bathing, eating,
3	grooming, and	dressing, and may include other activities to help
4	maintain the i	ndependence of an individual at home. Attendant
5	care shall not	include physical contact in support, including
6	but not limite	d to weight-bearing assistance with transfers,
7	washing, bathi	ng, and dressing.
8	"Care coo	rdination" means a person-centered, assessment-
9	based, interdi	sciplinary approach to integrating health care and
10	social support	services that are tailored to an individual's
11	needs and goal	s across all care services.
12	"Care rec	ipient" means an individual who:
13	<u>(1)</u>	citizen of the United States or a qualified
14	alie	n; provided that for the purposes of this
15	para	graph, "qualified alien" means a lawfully admitted
16	perm	anent resident under the Immigration and
17	Nati	onality Act;
18	(2) Is s	ixty years of age or older;
19	<u>(3)</u> Is n	ot covered by any comparable government or private
20	home	- and community-based care services;

1	(4)	Does not reside in a long-term care facility, such as
2		an intermediate care facility, assisted living
3		facility, skilled nursing facility, hospital,
4		community care foster family home, adult residential
5		care home, or expanded adult residential care home;
6		<u>and</u>
7	(5)	Has impairments of at least:
8		(A) Two activities of daily living;
9		(B) Two instrumental activities of daily living;
10		(C) One activity of daily living and one instrumental
11		activity of daily living; or
12		(D) Substantive cognitive impairment requiring
13		substantial supervision because the individual
14		behaves in a manner that poses a serious health
15		or safety hazard to the individual or another
16		person.
17	"Cas	e management" means assistance either in the form of
18	access or	care coordination in circumstances where an individual
19	is experi	encing diminished functioning capacities, personal
20	condition	s, or other characteristics that require the provision
21	of servic	es by formal service providers or family caregivers.

1	Activitie	s of case management may include assessing needs,
2	developin	g care plans, authorizing and coordinating services
3	among pro	viders, and providing follow-up and reassessment, as
4	required.	
5	<u>"Cho</u>	re" means assistance such as heavy housework, yard
6	work, or	sidewalk maintenance for a person.
7	"Coa	ch" means an individual who:
8	(1)	Helps the care recipient understand the program of
9		participant-directed services and support;
10	(2)	Develops and implements a spending plan to describe
11		how the care recipient will spend the care recipient's
12		budget; and
13	(3)	Evaluates whether the participant-directed service and
14		support program is meeting the care recipient's needs.
15	<u>"Fam</u>	ily caregivers" means a spouse, adult child, other
16	relative,	partner, or friend who has a personal relationship
17	with, and	provides a broad range of unpaid assistance for an
18	older adu	lt with a chronic or disabling condition.
19	"Hom	e delivered meals" means a meal provided to a care
20	recipient	in the care recipient's place of residence; provided
21	that the	meal is served in a program administered by the

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executive office on aging or an area agency on aging and meets 1 2 all of the requirements of the Older Americans Act of 1965, as 3 amended, and all state and local laws. "Homemaker" means assistance with preparing meals, shopping 4 5 for personal items, managing money, using the telephone, or 6 performing light housework. 7 "Instrumental activities of daily living" means the 8 following instrumental activities that individuals perform as a 9 part of daily living: preparing meals, shopping for personal items, medication management, managing money, using the 10 telephone, performing light housework, performing heavy 11 12 housework, and making use of available transportation. "Kupuna care core services" means services consisting of: 13 Adult day care; 14 (1) 15 (2) Attendant care; 16 (3) Case management; 17 (4)Chore; 18 (5) Homemaker; 19 (6) Home delivered meals; (7) Personal care; 20

(8) Transportation; or

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1 (9) Assisted transportation. 2 "Personal care" means personal assistance, stand-by 3 assistance, supervision, or cues. 4 "Person-centered support plan" or "support plan" means a 5 plan developed by a care recipient with the assistance of a 6 coach that allows the care recipient to establish the goals, 7 skills, and knowledge necessary to work toward the desired 8 outcomes and lays out practical steps toward the achievement of 9 the goals; provided that family members and friends may provide 10 assistance in developing a care recipient's plan if the care 11 recipient chooses to include them. 12 "Person-centered planning" means a process, directed by the 13 care recipient, intended to identify the strengths, capacities, 14 preferences, needs, and desired outcomes of the care recipient. 15 "Qualified caregiver" means an individual who meets the 16 following requirements: 17 (1) Provides care for a care recipient; and 18 (2) Is employed at least thirty hours per week from one or 19 more employers. 20 "Respite care" means services which offer temporary, 21 substitute supports, or living arrangements for care recipients

1	in order	to provide a brief period of rest to caregivers.
2	"Respite	care" includes:
3	(1)	In-home respite (personal care, homemaker, and other
4		<pre>in-home respite);</pre>
5	(2)	Respite provided by attendance of the care recipient
6		at a senior center or other nonresidential program;
7	(3)	Institutional respite provided by placing the care
8		recipient in an institutional setting such as a
9		nursing home for a short period of time as a respite
10		service to the caregiver; and
11	(4)	Any combination of services to assist the caregiver as
12		deemed appropriate by the area agency on aging.
13	"Tra	nsportation" means transportation from one location to
14	another w	ith a vehicle and does not include any other activity.
15	<u>§349</u>	-B Kupuna caregivers program. (a) The executive
16	office on	aging shall establish the kupuna caregivers program.
17	The progr	am shall provide assistance to a qualified caregiver
18	who meets	the requirements of this section.
19	(b)	The program shall be coordinated and administered by
20	the execu	tive office on aging and implemented through the area
21	agency on	aging.

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1 The kupuna careqivers program shall award an 2 allocation of funds, subject to the availability of funding and up to a maximum of \$70 per day, to cover costs for the following 3 services that would otherwise be performed by the qualified 4 5 caregiver for the care recipient: 6 Transportation or assisted transportation; (1) 7 (2) Personal care; 8 (3) Respite care; 9 (4) Adult day care; or 10 (5) Chore and homemaker services; provided that the allocated funds shall be issued directly to 11 12 the service provider upon request and receipt of an invoice for 13 services rendered. (d) The director may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 14 necessary for the purposes of this section." 15 SECTION 3. Chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, part II, 16 17 is amended by amending its title to read as follows: "[+] PART II.[+] KUPUNA CARE AND CAREGIVER SUPPORT SERVICES" 18 SECTION 4. Section 349-3.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall 19

be appropriately renumbered and included in part II of chapter

349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and amended to read as follows:

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1	"[§349-3.1] <u>§349-</u> Kupuna care program. (a) The
2	executive office on aging $[may]$ \underline{shall} establish the kupuna care
3	program. The program shall provide [affordable and quality
4	home and community based services.] long-term services and
5	supports to address the needs of Hawaii's older adults and their
6	desire to remain in their own homes and communities as they age.
7	(b) The program [may be provided in every county as a
8	function of the aging and disability resource centers.] shall be
9	coordinated and administered by the executive office on aging
10	and implemented through the area agencies on aging.
11	(c) The kupuna care program shall be delivered through two
12	distinct service options: traditional service delivery or
13	participant-directed services and support, based on an
14	individual support plan for each eligible care recipient;
15	provided that:
16	(1) Traditional service delivery shall be a service
17	provider organization or person who provides services
18	to clients under a formal contractual arrangement with
19	the executive office on aging or area agency on aging
20	who shall deliver to each care recipient one or more
21	kupuna care core services to address the care

1		recipient's specific needs that have been identified
2		in the care recipient's person-centered planning; and
3	(2)	Participant-directed services and support shall
4		address the care recipient's assessed needs that have
5		been identified through the person-centered planning
6		process and documented in the support plan.
7		Participant-directed services and support shall
8		consist of long-term services and supports that a care
9		recipient uses to maintain independence in the
10		community, in which the care recipient determines what
11		mix of services and support will address the care
12		recipient's needs. The care recipient shall have
13		decision-making authority over the care recipient's
14		budgeted dollar amount to purchase and manage the
15		needed services and supports based upon the care
16		recipient's person-centered support plan.
17		Participant-directed services and support shall
18		provide the care recipient with a coach to assist the
19		care recipient with using the services and support in
20		a manner that best supports the care recipient's

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1		ability to maintain independence and enable a quality
2		living experience in the community.
3	<u>(d)</u>	To qualify for the kupuna care program, an individual
4	shall be	a care recipient, as defined in section 349-A.
5	(e)	An area agency on aging, through the aging and
6	disabilit	y resource center or other entity designated by the
7	executive	office on aging, shall conduct an intake and
8	assessmen	t of individuals seeking long-term services and
9	supports	to determine eligibility for the program. The intake
10	and asses	sment shall include the following:
11	(1)	A statewide uniform intake process developed with and
12		adopted by the executive office on aging to
13		preliminarily determine eligibility for publicly
14		funded services and supports, including kupuna care
15		services; and
16	(2)	If necessary, an assessment of the eligible care
17		recipient utilizing a statewide, uniform comprehensive
18		in-home assessment. Upon completion of the in-home
19		assessment, the care recipient develops a written
20		individualized person-centered support plan, with
21		participation from family, friends, and others, if the

1		care recipient desires such additional assistance.
2		The support plan identifies all the services and
3		supports needed or currently used to meet the care
4		recipient's needs, both formal and informal, including
5		those provided by other programs such as medicaid or
6		private paid programs. The plan shall be reviewed
7		with the care recipient to confirm that it is the plan
8		the care recipient desires.
9	(f)	An area agency on aging shall use the assessment data
10	and indiv	idual's support plan to confirm kupuna care program
11	eligibili	ty, then authorize and coordinate services and
12	supports.	An area agency on aging shall directly authorize and
13	allot kup	una care services, and shall not delegate the service
14	authoriza	tion function to its subcontractors.
15	(g)	An individual shall be determined to be ineligible for
16	kupuna ca	re services when:
17	(1)	An individual does not meet the eligibility
18		requirements specified;
19	(2)	An individual need is not substantiated through an in-
20		home assessment;

1	(3) An individual leaves the State or the individual's
2	whereabouts are unknown; or
3	(4) An individual refuses services.
4	(h) An area agency on aging shall provide an individual
5	with written notice of the disposition of the request for kupuna
6	care services.
7	(i) An individual who has been determined ineligible for
8	kupuna care services shall have the opportunity to appeal the
9	decision to the director of the executive office on aging within
10	ninety days after the date of notice of the area agency on
11	aging's written disposition. The director of the executive
12	office on aging's decision on the appeal shall be issued in
13	writing and shall be final.
14	(j) Prior to termination of kupuna care services, service
15	providers shall notify the appropriate contracting area agency
16	on aging of the date and reason for termination. Termination of
17	kupuna care services may occur if the care recipient:
18	(1) Moves and the provider is unable to locate the care
19	<pre>recipient;</pre>
20	(2) Is transferred to another area agency on aging;
21	(3) Dies;

1	(4)	No longer needs kupuna care services and supports;
2	(5)	Is uncooperative with the service provider;
3	(6)	Is non-compliant with the basic requirements of the
4		program;
5	(7)	Engages in behavior that threatens or demonstrates
6		violence toward the service provider;
7	(8)	Decides the care recipient no longer needs or wants a
8		particular service or support;
9	(9)	Uses comparable services from other programs; or
10	(10)	Has a communicable disease that threatens the safety
11		and welfare of the service provider.
12	<u>(k)</u>	All area agencies on aging shall record all consumer
13	data, assessments, and service delivery within a statewide	
14	consolidated database.	
15	[(c) As used in this section, unless the context otherwise	
16	requires:	
17	"Aging and disability resource centers" means an entity	
18	established by the State as part of the state system of long-	
19	term care, serving as a highly visible and trusted source where	
20	people of	all incomes and ages can get information on the full
