A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KUPUNA CARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that the State must find SECTION 1. 2 new ways to accommodate a broader range of home- and community-3 based long-term care options for Hawaii's rapidly growing 4 elderly population. According to 2015 population data from the 5 department of business, economic development, and tourism, there 6 are 236,914 persons, or 16.5 per cent of the population, 65 7 years and older in Hawaii. The percentage of this population is 8 projected to rise to 19.4 per cent by 2020 and 23 per cent by 9 2030.

10 The legislature further finds that family caregivers play a 11 major role in the State's health care system by providing long-12 term care to the elderly. According to AARP, there are 154,000 13 unpaid family caregivers in Hawaii, with the average caregiver 14 being a 62-year-old married woman who cares for an elderly 15 parent or husband while still working. Caregiving for an 16 elderly family member takes a toll on caregivers, and care 17 recipients often worry they will become a burden on family 18 Numerous studies show that caregivers report higher members. 2017-1187 SB534 SD1 SMA.doc 1

1 levels of psychological distress, and caring for elderly family 2 members over extended periods of time without compensation can 3 lead to chronic stress. In some instances, adult children who work on the mainland may have to return home to live, and 4 5 abandon careers in the process, in order to care for their 6 parents at home because it is the only alternative to expensive 7 institutional care. If children already live in Hawaii, they 8 often have to guit their jobs to stay home to care for aging 9 parents, which may result in financial disaster for the family 10 and a loss of tax revenue for the State. While careqivers play 11 a critical role in helping others, it is imperative that 12 careqivers take care of themselves and have the necessary 13 services and supports to sustain their own health as well as the 14 health of the family member for which they are caring.

15 The purpose of this Act is to:

16 (1) Require the executive office on aging to establish the
17 kupuna caregivers program to assist community members
18 in obtaining care for elders while remaining in the
19 workforce;

20 (2) Clarify the kupuna services and supports provided by21 area agencies on aging within the kupuna care program

1	and make establishment of the kupuna care program
2	mandatory; and
3	(3) Appropriate funds for the establishment and
4	implementation of the kupuna caregivers program.
5	SECTION 2. Chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
7	and to read as follows:
8	" §349- Kupuna caregivers program. (a) The executive
9	office on aging shall establish the kupuna caregivers program.
10	The program shall provide assistance to a qualified caregiver
11	who meets the requirements of this section.
12	(b) The program shall be coordinated and administered by
13	the executive office on aging and implemented through the area
14	agency on aging.
15	(c) The kupuna caregivers program shall award a voucher of
16	a maximum of \$70 per day to cover costs for the following
17	services that would otherwise be performed by the qualified
18	caregiver for the care recipient:
19	(1) Transportation;
20	(2) Personal care;
21	(3) Respite care;

9	The area	agency on aging shall directly authorize and allot
10	kupuna ca	re services and shall not delegate the service
11	authoriza	tion function to any subcontractors.
12	(g)	An individual shall be determined to be ineligible for
13	kupuna ca	re services when:
14	(1)	An individual does not meet the eligibility
15		requirements specified;
16	(2)	An individual's need is not substantiated through an
17		in-home assessment;
18	(3)	An individual leaves the State or the individual's
19		whereabouts are unknown; or
20	(4)	An individual refuses services.

1	(h) The area agency on aging shall provide an individual
2	with written notice of the disposition of a request for kupuna
3	care services.
4	(i) An individual who has been determined to be ineligible
5	for kupuna care services shall have the opportunity to appeal
6	the decision to the director of the executive office on aging
7	within ninety days after the date of notice of the area agency
8	on aging's written disposition. The director of the executive
9	office on aging's decision on the appeal shall be issued in
10	writing and shall be final.
11	(j) Prior to termination of kupuna care services, service
12	providers shall notify the contracting area agency on aging of
13	the date and reason for termination. Termination of kupuna care
14	services may occur if the participant:
15	(1) Moves and the provider is unable to locate the
16	participant;
17	(2) Is transferred to another area agency on aging;
18	(3) Dies;
19	(4) No longer needs kupuna care services and supports;
20	(5) Is uncooperative with the service provider;

7	term care, serving as a highly visible and trusted source where
8	people of all incomes and ages can get information on the full
9	range of long-term support options, and a single point of entry
10	for access to public long-term support programs and benefits.
11	"Area agency on aging" means a state agency designated to
12	develop and administer the area plan for a comprehensive and
13	coordinated system of aging services.
14	"Assisted transportation" means assistance with
15	transportation, including escort, for a person who has
16	difficulties, cognitive or physical, using regular vehicular
17	transportation.
18	"Attendant care" means stand-by assistance, supervision, or
19	cues, and may include other activities to help maintain the
20	independence of an individual at home. Attendant care shall not
21	include providing hands-on-the-body support, including but not

1	limited to weight-bearing assistance with transfers; washing,
2	bathing, or grooming a participant's body; or guiding a
3	participant's limbs or implements to assist with feeding or
4	dressing.
5	"Care coordination" means a person-centered, assessment-
6	based, interdisciplinary approach to integrating health care and
7	social support services that are tailored to an individual's
8	needs and goals across all care services.
9	"Case management" means assistance either in the form of
10	access or care coordination in circumstances where an individual
11	is experiencing diminished functioning capacities, personal
12	conditions, or other characteristics that require the provision
13	of services by formal service providers or family caregivers.
14	Activities of case management may include assessing needs,
15	developing care plans, authorizing and coordinating services
16	among providers, and providing follow-up and reassessment, as
17	required.
18	"Chore" means assistance such as heavy housework, yard
19	work, or sidewalk maintenance for a person.
20	"Coach" means an individual who:

12	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
13	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$600,000 or so much
14	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
15	sum of \$6,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for
16	fiscal year 2018-2019 for the establishment and implementation
17	of the kupuna caregivers program.
18	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the executive
19	office on aging for the purposes of this Act.
20	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
21	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

Report Title:

Kupuna Care; Caregivers; Executive Office on Aging; Appropriation

Description:

Requires the executive office on aging to establish the kupuna caregivers program to assist community members in obtaining care for elders while remaining in the workforce. Makes establishment of the kupuna care program mandatory rather than discretionary. Clarifies the kupuna service and support options provided by area agencies on aging within the kupuna care program. Appropriates funds for establishing and implementing the kupuna caregivers program. (SD1)

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
