A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KUPUNA CARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State must find 2 new ways to accommodate a broader range of home- and community-
- 3 based long-term care options for Hawaii's rapidly growing
- 4 elderly population. According to 2015 population data from the
- 5 department of business, economic development, and tourism, there
- $\mathbf{6}$ are 236,914 persons, or 16.5 per cent of the population, 65
- 7 years and older in Hawaii. The percentage of this population is
- 8 projected to rise to 19.4 per cent by 2020 and 23 per cent by
- 9 2030.
- 10 The legislature further finds that family caregivers play a
- 11 major role in the State's health care system by providing long-
- 12 term care to the elderly. According to AARP, there are 154,000
- 13 unpaid family caregivers in Hawaii, with the average caregiver
- 14 being a 62-year-old married woman who cares for an elderly
- 15 parent or husband while still working. Caregiving for an
- 16 elderly family member takes a toll on caregivers, and care
- 17 recipients often worry they will become a burden on family



1	members.	Numerous	studies	show	that	caregivers	report	higher
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- 2 levels of psychological distress, and caring for elderly family
- 3 members over extended periods of time without compensation can
- 4 lead to chronic stress. In some instances, adult children who
- 5 work on the mainland may have to return home to live, and
- 6 abandon careers in the process, in order to care for their
- 7 parents at home because it is the only alternative to expensive
- 8 institutional care. If children already live in Hawaii, they
- 9 often have to quit their jobs to stay home to care for aging
- 10 parents, which may result in financial disaster for the family
- 11 and a loss of tax revenue for the State. While caregivers play
- 12 a critical role in helping others, it is imperative that
- 13 caregivers take care of themselves and have the necessary
- 14 services and supports to sustain their own health as well as the
- 15 health of the family member for which they are caring.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to:
- 17 (1) Require the executive office on aging to establish the
- 18 kupuna careqivers program to assist community members
- in obtaining care for elders while remaining in the
- workforce;

1	(2)	Clarify the kupuna services and supports provided by
2		area agencies on aging within the kupuna care program
3		and make establishment of the kupuna care program
4		mandatory; and
5	(3)	Appropriate funds for the establishment and
6		implementation of the kupuna caregivers program.
7	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
9	and to re	ad as follows:
10	" <u>§34</u>	9- Kupuna caregivers program. (a) The executive
11	office on	aging shall establish the kupuna caregivers program.
12	The progr	am shall provide assistance to a qualified caregiver
13	who meets	the requirements of this section.
14	(b)	The program shall be coordinated and administered by
15	the execu	tive office on aging and implemented through the area
16	agency on	aging.
17	(c)	The kupuna caregivers program shall award a voucher of
18	a maximum	of \$70 per day to cover costs for the following
19	services	that would otherwise be performed by the qualified
20	caregiver	for the care recipient:
21	(1)	Transportation;

1	(2) Personal care;
2	(3) Respite care;
3	(4) Adult day care; or
4	(5) Chore and homemaker;
5	provided that the voucher shall be issued directly to the
6	service provider.
7	(d) The director may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
8	necessary for the purposes of this section.
9	(e) As used in this section, unless the context otherwise
10	requires:
11	"Activities of daily living" shall be as defined in section
12	349-3.1.
13	"Adult day care" shall be as defined in section 349-3.1.
14	"Area agency on aging" shall be as defined in section 349-
15	3.1.
16	"Care recipient" means an individual who:
17	(1) Is a citizen of the United States or a qualified
18	alien; provided that for the purposes of this
19	paragraph, "qualified alien" means a lawfully admitted
20	permanent resident under the Immigration and
21	Nationality Act;

1	(2)	Is sixty years of age or older;
2	(3)	Is not covered by any comparable government or private
3		home and community based care services;
4	(4)	Does not reside in a long-term care facility, such as
5		an intermediate care facility, assisted living
6		facility, skilled nursing facility, hospital,
7		community care foster family home, adult residential
8		care home, or expanded adult residential care home;
9		and
10	(5)	Has impairments of at least:
11		(A) Two activities of daily living;
12		(B) Two instrumental activities of daily living;
13		(C) One activity of daily living and one instrumental
14		activity of daily living; or
15		(D) Substantive cognitive impairment requiring
16		substantial supervision because the individual
17		behaves in a manner that poses a serious health
18		or safety hazard to the individual or another
19		person.
20	"Cho	re" shall be as defined in section 349-3.1.
21	"Hom	emaker" shall be as defined in section 349-3.1.

1	"Instrumental activities of daily living" shall be as
2	defined in section 349-3.1.
3	"Personal care" shall be as defined in section 349-3.1.
4	"Qualified caregiver" means an individual who meets the
5	following requirements:
6	(1) Provides care for a care recipient; and
7	(2) Is employed at least thirty hours per week from one or
8	more employers.
9	"Respite care" shall be as defined in section 333F-1.
10	"Transportation" shall be as defined in section 349-3.1."
11	SECTION 3. Section 349-3.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended to read as follows:
13	"[+]§349-3.1[+] Kupuna care program. (a) The executive
14	office on aging $[may]$ shall establish the kupuna care program.
15	The program shall provide [affordable and quality home and
16	community based services.] long-term services and supports to
17	address the needs of Hawaii's older adults and their desire to
18	remain in their own homes and communities as they age.
19	(b) The program [may be provided in every county as a
20	function of the aging and digability resource centers. I shall be

1	coordinat	ed and administered by the executive office on aging
2	and imple	mented through the area agency on aging.
3	(c)	Kupuna care shall be delivered through two distinct
4	service o	ptions: traditional service delivery or participant-
.5	directed	services and support, based on an individual support
6	plan for	each eligible participant; provided that:
7	(1)	Traditional service delivery shall be a service
8		provider organization or person who provides services
9		to clients under a formal contractual arrangement with
10		the executive office on aging or an area agency on
11		aging who shall deliver to each participant one or
12		more kupuna care core services to address the
13		participant's specific needs that have been identified
14		through person-centered planning; and
15	(2)	Participant-directed services and support shall
16		address the participant's assessed needs that have
17		been identified through the person-centered planning
18		process and documented in the support plan.
19		Participant-directed services and support shall be
20		long-term services and supports that a participant
21		uses to maintain the participant's independence in the

1		community, in which the participant determines what
2		mix of services and support works best for the
3		participant. The participant shall have decision-
4		making authority over the participant's budgeted
5		dollar amount to purchase and manage the participant's
6		needed services and supports based on the
7		participant's person-centered support plan.
8		Participant-directed services and support shall
9		provide the participant with a coach to assist the
10		participant with using the services and support in a
11		manner that best supports the participant's ability to
12		maintain independence and enable a quality living
13		experience in the community.
14	(d)	To qualify for the kupuna care program, an individual
15	shall qua	lify as a care recipient pursuant to section 349- (e).
16	(e)	The area agency on aging, through the aging and
17	disabilit	y resource center or other entity designated by the
18	executive	office on aging, shall conduct an intake and
19	assessmen	t of individuals seeking long-term services and
20	supports	to determine eligibility for the program. The intake
21	and asses	sment shall include the following:

1	(1)	A statewide uniform intake developed with and adopted
2		by the executive office on aging to preliminarily
3		determine eligibility for publicly funded services and
4		supports, including kupuna care services; and
5	(2)	If warranted, an assessment of the eligible individual
6		utilizing a statewide uniform comprehensive in-home
7		assessment. Upon completion of the in-home
8		assessment, the individual develops a written
9		individualized person-centered support plan, with
10	·	participation from family, friends, and others, if the
11		individual desires such additional assistance. The
12		support plan identifies all of the services and
13		supports needed or currently used to meet the
14		individual's needs, formal and informal, including
15		those provided by other programs such as medicaid or
16		private paid programs. The plan shall be reviewed
17		with the individual to confirm it is the plan that the
18		individual desires.
19	(f)	The area agency on aging shall use the assessment data
20	and indiv	idualized support plan to confirm kupuna care
21	eliqibili	ty then authorize and coordinate services and supports.

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2		re services and shall not delegate the service
3	authoriza	tion function to any subcontractors.
4	<u>(g)</u>	An individual shall be determined to be ineligible for
5	kupuna ca	re services when:
6	(1)	An individual does not meet the eligibility
7		requirements specified;
8	(2)	An individual's need is not substantiated through an
9		<pre>in-home assessment;</pre>
0	(3)	An individual leaves the State or the individual's
1		whereabouts are unknown; or
2	(4)	An individual refuses services.
3	(h)	The area agency on aging shall provide an individual
4	with writ	ten notice of the disposition of a request for kupuna
.5	care serv	rices.
6	<u>(i)</u>	An individual who has been determined to be ineligible
17	for kupun	na care services shall have the opportunity to appeal

the decision to the director of the executive office on aging

within ninety days after the date of notice of the area agency

on aging's written disposition. The director of the executive

The area agency on aging shall directly authorize and allot

1	office on	aging's decision on the appeal shall be issued in
2	writing a	nd shall be final.
3	(j)	Prior to termination of kupuna care services, service
4	providers	shall notify the contracting area agency on aging of
5	the date	and reason for termination. Termination of kupuna care
6	services	may occur if the participant:
7	(1)	Moves and the provider is unable to locate the
8		participant;
9	(2)	Is transferred to another area agency on aging;
10	(3)	Dies;
11	(4)	No longer needs kupuna care services and supports;
12	(5)	Is uncooperative with the service provider;
13	(6)	Is non-compliant with the basic requirements of the
14		program;
15	(7)	Engages in behavior that threatens or demonstrates
16		violence toward the service provider;
17	(8)	Decides the participant no longer needs or wants a
18		particular service or support;
19	(9)	Uses comparable services from other programs; or
20	(10)	Has a communicable disease that threatens the safety
21		and welfare of the service provider.

(k) All area agencies on aging shall record all consumer 1 2 data, assessments, and service delivery within a statewide 3 consolidated database. 4 [(c)] (1) As used in this section, unless the context 5 otherwise requires: 6 "Activities of daily living" means the following activities 7 that individuals perform as a part of daily living: eating, 8 dressing, bathing, toileting, transferring in and out of a bed 9 or chair, and walking. "Adult day care" or "adult day health" means personal care 10 for dependent elders in a supervised, protective, and congregate 11 **12** setting during some portion of a day. Services offered in 13 conjunction with adult day care or adult day health typically 14 include social and recreational activities, training, counseling, and services such as rehabilitation, medication 15 16 assistance, and home health aide services for adult day health. "Aging and disability resource centers" means an entity 17 18 established by the State as part of the state system of longterm care, serving as a highly visible and trusted source where 19

people of all incomes and ages can get information on the full

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- 1 range of long-term support options, and a single point of entry
- 2 for access to public long-term support programs and benefits.
- 3 "Area agency on aging" means a state agency designated to
- 4 develop and administer the area plan for a comprehensive and
- 5 coordinated system of aging services.
- 6 "Assisted transportation" means assistance with
- 7 transportation, including escort, for a person who has
- 8 difficulties, cognitive or physical, using regular vehicular
- 9 transportation.
- 10 "Attendant care" means stand-by assistance, supervision, or
- 11 cues, and may include other activities to help maintain the
- 12 independence of an individual at home. Attendant care shall not
- 13 include providing hands-on-the-body support, including but not
- 14 limited to weight-bearing assistance with transfers; washing,
- 15 bathing, or grooming a participant's body; or guiding a
- 16 participant's limbs or implements to assist with feeding or
- 17 dressing.
- "Care coordination" means a person-centered, assessment-
- 19 based, interdisciplinary approach to integrating health care and
- 20 social support services that are tailored to an individual's
- 21 needs and goals across all care services.

1	"Cas	e management" means assistance either in the form of
2	access or	care coordination in circumstances where an individua
3	is experi	encing diminished functioning capacities, personal
4	condition	s, or other characteristics that require the provision
5	of servic	es by formal service providers or family caregivers.
6	<u>Activitie</u>	s of case management may include assessing needs,
7	developin	g care plans, authorizing and coordinating services
8	among pro	viders, and providing follow-up and reassessment, as
9	required.	
10	"Cho	re" means assistance such as heavy housework, yard
11	work, or	sidewalk maintenance for a person.
12	"Coa	ch" means an individual who:
13	(1)	Helps the participant understand the program of
14		participant-directed supports;
15	(2)	Develops and implements a spending plan to describe
16		how the participant will spend the participant's
17		budget; and
18	(3)	Evaluates whether the participant-directed program is
19		meeting the participant's needs.
20	"Fam	ily caregivers" means a spouse, adult child, other
21	relative,	partner, or friend who has a personal relationship

- 1 with, and provides a broad range of unpaid assistance for an
- 2 older adult with a chronic or disabling condition.
- 3 "Home delivered meals" means meals provided to a qualified
- 4 individual in the individual's place of residence; provided that
- 5 the meal is served through a program administered by the state
- 6 unit on aging or an area agency on aging and meets all of the
- 7 requirements of the Older Americans Act of 1965 as amended, and
- 8 all state and local laws.
- 9 "Homemaker" means assistance with preparing meals, shopping
- 10 for personal items, managing money, using the telephone, or
- 11 performing light housework.
- "Instrumental activities of daily living" means the
- 13 following instrumental activities that individuals perform as a
- 14 part of daily living: preparing meals, shopping for personal
- 15 items, medication management, managing money, using the
- 16 telephone, performing light housework, performing heavy
- 17 housework, and making use of available transportation.
- 18 "Kupuna care core services" means services consisting of:
- 19 (1) Adult day care;
- 20 (2) Attendant care;
- 21 (3) Case management;

              Chore;
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         (5)
              Homemaker;
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         (6)
              Home delivered meals;
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         (7) Personal care;
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         (8)
              Transportation; or
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         (9) Assisted transportation.
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         "Person-centered plan" means a plan developed by a
    participant with the assistance of a coach that allows the
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    participant to establish goals, skills, and knowledge necessary
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    to work toward the desired outcomes and lays out practical steps
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    to the achievement of the goals; provided that family members
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    and friends may provide assistance in developing a participant's
    plan if the participant chooses to include them.
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         "Person-centered planning" means a process, directed by the
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    participant, intended to identify the strengths, capacities,
    preferences, needs, and desired outcomes of the participant.
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         "Personal care" means personal assistance, stand-by
    assistance, supervision, or cues.
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         "Transportation" means transportation from one location to
    another with a yehicle and does not include any other activity.
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- 1 [(d)] <u>(i)</u> The director shall adopt rules pursuant to
- 2 chapter 91 necessary for the purposes of this section."
- 3 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
- 6 sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for
- 7 fiscal year 2018-2019 for the establishment and implementation
- 8 of the kupuna caregivers program.
- 9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the executive
- 10 office on aging for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Kupuna Care; Caregivers; Executive Office on Aging; Appropriation

Description:

Requires the executive office on aging to establish the kupuna caregivers program to assist community members in obtaining care for elders while remaining in the workforce. Makes establishment of the kupuna care program mandatory rather than discretionary. Clarifies the kupuna service and support options provided by area agencies on aging within the kupuna care program.
