A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGISTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that school psychologists
 provide effective services to help children and youth succeed
 academically, socially, behaviorally, and emotionally by
 providing direct educational and mental health services for
 children and youth, as well as working with parents, educators,
 and other professionals to create supportive learning and social
 environments for all children.

8 Currently, Hawaii is the only state without certification 9 of licensure for school psychologists. Without orderly 10 licensing, the State cannot ensure that functioning school 11 psychologists are properly qualified and delivering appropriate 12 services. In addition, the State's failure to properly license 13 school psychologists means that by law the State is unable to 14 seek warranted reimbursements from the federal medicaid program 15 for the use of school psychologists in an educational setting. 16 Consequently, it is necessary to establish a licensure program 17 to ensure the employment of qualified school psychologists and

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to allow schools utilizing school psychologists to properly seek
 available federal medicaid funds.

3 Additionally, the present licensing statute for 4 psychologists, pursuant to section 465-3(a)(3), Hawaii Revised 5 Statutes, does not apply to school psychologists in the public 6 sector, while school psychologists in the private sector are 7 subject to licensure. This inconsistency may cause confusion 8 and unfairness within the profession. Because the State does 9 not have certification of licensure for school psychologists, it 10 is important to specify the conditions in which a school 11 psychologist is exempt from licensure under chapter 465, Hawaii 12 Revised Statutes, to prevent potentially causing harm to 13 students and others and to be fair and consistent for persons 14 within the profession.

15 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

16 (1) Establish the licensure of school psychologists in
17 alignment with the National Association of School
18 Psychologists standards to ensure the continued
19 delivery of quality service to students and the
20 community;

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1	(2)	Specify that persons licensed as school psychologists
2		shall not engage in private practice;
3	(3)	Specify that school psychologists who are employed by
4		an educational institution and practice only within a
5		school setting shall be exempt from licensure under
6		chapter 465, Hawaii Revised Statutes;
7	(4)	Amend the name of the Hawaii teacher standards board
8		to the Hawaii teacher standards and school
9		psychologists board;
10	(5)	Amend the composition of the Hawaii teacher standards
11		board to include two school psychologists; and
12	(6)	Require a report to the legislature.
13	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended b	y adding a new section to part III, subpart D, to be
15	appropria	tely designated and to read as follows:

17	person sh	all represent, announce, or advertise oneself, publicly
18	or privat	ely, as a school psychologist or affix any other words,

8	the applicant shall file an application in a form prescribed by

11	(c) A person licensed as a school psychologist pursuant to					
12	this section shall practice only within a school setting and					
13	shall not engage in private practice."					
14	SECTION 3. Chapter 302A, part III, subpart D, Hawaii					
15	Revised Statutes, is amended by amending its title to read as					
16	follows:					
17	"D. Hawaii Teacher Standards and School Psychologists

19	SECTION 4. Section 302A-801, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is					
20	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:					

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1 "(a) There is established the Hawaii teacher standards and 2 school psychologists board, which shall be placed within the 3 department for administrative purposes only. The board shall 4 consist of [seventeen] nineteen members, including not less than six licensed teachers regularly engaged in teaching at the time 5 6 of the appointment, three educational officers employed at the 7 time of the appointment, the chairperson of the board of 8 education or the chairperson's designee, the superintendent or 9 the superintendent's designee, a representative of independent 10 schools, the dean of the University of Hawaii college of 11 education or the dean's designee, [and] the chairperson of the 12 Native Hawaiian Education Council or the chairperson's 13 designee[+], two school psychologists, and two members of the 14 public; provided that one teacher member shall be engaged in teaching at a Hawaii public charter school at the time of 15 16 appointment and the dean's designee shall be chosen from the 17 member institutions of the teacher education coordinating 18 committee established under section 304A-1202[, and two members 19 of the public]. A non-voting teacher candidate from a Hawaii 20 educator preparation program at a public institution of higher 21 education on a rotating basis shall be appointed by the

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1 chairperson of the teacher education coordinating committee to 2 serve a one-year term." 3 Section 465-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is SECTION 5. 4 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 5 "(a) This chapter shall not apply to: 6 Any person teaching, lecturing, consulting, or (1)7 engaging in research in psychology insofar as the 8 activities are performed as part of or are dependent 9 upon employment in a college or university; provided 10 that the person shall not engage in the practice of 11 psychology outside the responsibilities of the 12 person's employment; 13 (2)Any person who performs any, or any combination of the 14 professional services defined as the practice of 15 psychology under the direction of a licensed 16 psychologist in accordance with rules adopted by the 17 board; provided that the person may use the term 18 "psychological assistant", but shall not identify the 19 person's self as a psychologist or imply that the 20 person is licensed to practice psychology; 21 Any person employed by [a]: (3)

19		who	is designated by a title as "psychology trainee",

21		"psy	chology resident", that indicates the person's

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1 training status; provided that the person shall not 2 identify the person's self as a psychologist or imply 3 that the person is licensed to practice psychology; 4 (5) Any person who is a member of another profession 5 licensed under the laws of this jurisdiction to render 6 or advertise services, including psychotherapy, within 7 the scope of practice as defined in the statutes or 8 rules regulating the person's professional practice; 9 provided that, notwithstanding section 465-1, the 10 person does not represent the person's self to be a 11 psychologist or does not represent that the person is 12 licensed to practice psychology; 13 Any person who is a member of a mental health (6) 14 profession not requiring licensure; provided that the 15 person functions only within the person's professional 16 capacities; and provided further that the person does 17 not represent the person to be a psychologist, or the 18 person's services as psychological; 19 (7) Any person who is a duly recognized member of the 20 clergy; provided that the person functions only within

the person's capacities as a member of the clergy; and

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1		provided further that the person does not represent
2		the person to be a psychologist, or the person's
3		services as psychological;
4	(8)	Any psychologist employed by the United States
5		Department of Defense, while engaged in the discharge
6		of the psychologist's official duty and providing
7		direct telehealth support or services, as defined in
8		section 431:10A-116.3, to neighbor island
9		beneficiaries within a Hawaii National Guard armory on
10		the island of Kauai, Hawaii, Molokai, or Maui;
11		provided that the psychologist employed by the United
12		States Department of Defense is credentialed by
13		Tripler Army Medical Center; or
14	(9)	Any supervisee of a licensed psychologist as defined
15		in section 465D-7."
16	SECT	ION 6. Sections 302A-101, 302A-501, 302A-602, 302A-
17	602.5, 30	2A-702, 302A-803, 302A-806, 302A-808, 302D-26, 304A-
18	701, 304A	-1201, 304A-1202, 315-2, and 315-3, Hawaii Revised
19	Statutes,	are amended by substituting the term "Hawaii teacher
20	standards	and school psychologists board" wherever the term

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"Hawaii teacher standards board" appears, as the context
 requires.

3 SECTION 7. The Hawaii teacher standards and school
4 psychologists board shall submit a report to the legislature,
5 regarding licensure of school psychologists, as established by
6 section 2 of this Act, no later than twenty days prior to the
7 convening of the regular session of 2022.

8 SECTION 8. This Act does not affect rights and duties that 9 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were 10 begun before its effective date.

SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketedand stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

13 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050, 14 and shall be repealed on July 1, 2026; provided that the title 15 of chapter 302A, part III, subpart D, and sections 302A-801, 16 465-3, 302A-101, 302A-501, 302A-602, 302A-602.5, 302A-702, 302A-17 803, 302A-806, 302A-808, 302D-26, 304A-701, 304A-1201, 304A-18 1202, 315-2, and 315-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be 19 reenacted in the form in which they read on the day before the 20 effective date of this Act.

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Report Title:

School Psychologist; Licensure; School Setting; Hawaii Teacher Standards and School Psychologists Board

Description:

Establishes licensure requirements for school psychologists to be administered by the Hawaii teacher standards board. Prohibits private practice by school psychologists. Amends the name of the Hawaii teacher standards board to the Hawaii teacher standards and school psychologists board and amends the board's composition to include two school psychologists. Specifies that school psychologists who are employed by an educational institution and practice only within a school setting shall be exempt from licensure under chapter 465, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Requires the board to report to legislature. Sunsets 7/1/2026. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD2)
