A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII TEACHER STANDARDS BOARD.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Section 302A-802, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended to read as follows:

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"§302A-802 Licensing and certification standards;

4 policies. (a) The board shall establish licensing and
5 certification standards that govern teacher licensing and
6 certification in Hawaii. Licensing and certification standards
7 established by the board shall be adopted as rules under chapter
8 91 unless otherwise specified in this subpart.

9 (b) In the development of its standards, the board shall 10 consider the existing teacher applicant pool that is available 11 in the State and the level of the qualification of these 12 applicants, as well as the nature and availability of existing 13 preservice teacher training programs.

14 (c) The board shall adopt policies, exempt from chapters15 91 and 92, to initiate the following:

16 (1) Develop criteria allowing more individuals with trade
17 or industry experience to teach in vocational,



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1 technical, and career pathway programs, and criteria 2 for the issuance of permits allowing gualified 3 individuals to teach when recommended by the 4 superintendent or the commission, when appropriate. 5 The department or the commission, when appropriate, shall be responsible for the review and acceptance of 6 7 the relevant licenses, certificates, or other qualifications related to an individual's vocational, 8 9 technical, or career pathway education-related 10 experience that the department or the commission, when 11 appropriate, deems necessary for a permit. The department or the commission, when appropriate, shall 12 13 have the authority to waive the requirement of a 14 bachelor's degree to teach in a vocation, technical, 15 or career pathway education program; Develop a plan to accept teachers from any state as 16 (2)17 long as they have completed state-approved teacher 18 education programs and pass relevant Hawaii teacher 19 examinations or their equivalent;

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1	(3)	Clarify the requirements, on a state-by-state basis,
2		for out-of-state licensed teachers to obtain a license
3		in Hawaii;
4	(4)	Develop a plan to facilitate licensing for those who
5		intend to teach in Hawaii immersion programs, the
6		island of Niihau, or any other extraordinary situation
7		as defined by the superintendent or the
8		superintendent's designee, or by the commission, when
9		appropriate; [and]
10	(5)	Pursue full teacher license reciprocity with all other
11		states[-]; and
12	(6)	Develop a plan to facilitate an optional certification
13		for those who teach or intend to teach at private
14		schools."
15	SECT	ION 2. Section 302A-803, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended to	o read as follows:
17	"§30:	2A-803 Powers and duties of the board. (a) In
18	addition ⁻	to establishing standards for the issuance and renewal
19	of license	es and certificates and any other powers and duties
20	authorized	d by law, the board's powers shall also include:
21	(1)	Setting and administering its own budget;

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1	(2)	Adopting, amending, or repealing the rules of the
2		board in accordance with chapter 91;
3	(3)	Receiving grants or donations from private
4		foundations, and state and federal funds;
5	(4)	Submitting an annual report to the governor, the
6		legislature, and the board of education on the board's
7		operations and expenditures, and from the 2007-2008
8		school year, submitting a summary report every five
9		years of the board's accomplishment of objectives,
10		efforts to improve or maintain teacher quality, and
11		efforts to keep its operations responsive and
12		efficient;
13	(5)	Conducting a cyclical review of standards and
14		suggesting revisions for their improvement;
15	(6)	Establishing licensing and certification fees in
16		accordance with chapter 91 and determining the manner
17		by which fees are collected and subsequently deposited
18		into the state treasury and credited to the general
19		fund;
20	(7)	Establishing penalties in accordance with chapter 91;

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1	(8)	Issuing, renewing, forfeiting, restoring,				
2		conditioning, revoking, suspending, and reinstating				
3		licenses[+] and certificates;				
4	(9)	Developing criteria for a full career and technical				
5		education license, limited to career and technical				
6		education teaching assignments, allowing qualified				
7		individuals with at least an associate's degree,				
8		coursework, industry experience, and content expertise				
9		to teach;				
10	(10)	Reviewing reports from the department and commission				
11		on individuals hired on an emergency basis;				
12	(11)	Applying licensing and certification standards on a				
13		case-by-case basis and conducting licensing and				
14		certification evaluations;				
15	(12)	Preparing and disseminating teacher licensing and				
16		certification information to schools and operational				
17		personnel;				
18	(13)	Approving teacher preparation programs;				
19	(14)	Establishing policies and procedures for approving				
20		alternative pathways to teaching;				

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1	(15)	Administering reciprocity agreements with other states
2		relative to licensing;
3	(16)	Conducting research and development on teacher
4		licensure systems, beginning teacher programs, the

7	(17)	Participating in efforts relating to teacher quality
8		issues, professional development related to the
9		board's standards, and promotion of high teacher
10		standards and accomplished teaching;
11	(18)	Upon declaration of a state of emergency pursuant to
12		section 127A-14, extending the expiration date of any
13		license, certificate, or permit until June 30 of the
14		following school year;
15	[(18)]	(19) Adopting applicable rules and procedures; [and]
16	[(19)]	(20) Adopting, amending, repealing, or suspending the
17		policies and standards of the board $[-]$; and
18	(21)	Issuing and renewing an optional certificate for those
19		who teach or intend to teach at private schools.
20	(b)	If, in accordance with chapter 92, the board
21	determine	s, on a case-by-case basis, that extenuating

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circumstances exist to justify the suspension, the board may
 temporarily suspend its rules, or any portion thereof. The
 board shall establish, in accordance with chapter 91, procedures
 for the suspension of its rules. When determining whether to
 suspend its rules, the board shall also establish the length of
 time for which the suspension shall be in effect.

7 (c) The board, in accordance with chapter 92, may also
8 amend licensing-related <u>and certification-related</u> fees and set
9 or amend other charges related to the performance of its duties.

10 (d) The board may delegate to its executive director, or
11 other designee, any of its powers and duties as it deems
12 reasonable and proper; provided that the delegation of powers
13 and duties by the board shall be made in accordance with
14 procedures set forth in this subsection. The board shall not
15 delegate its discretionary functions resulting in a final
16 decision in:

17 (1) Adopting, amending, or repealing rules;
18 (2) Ordering disciplinary action against a licensee,
19 including license revocation or suspension, or the
20 imposition of conditions or fines; provided that
21 summary suspensions may be delegated; or

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1 (3) Denying permits [or], licenses, or certificates, including license and certificate renewals and 2 reinstatements, or otherwise conditioning permits 3 4 [or], licenses, or certificates unless the denying, or 5 otherwise conditioning of a permit [or], license, or certificate does not require the exercise of the 6 7 board's expertise and discretion. 8 To delegate authority, the concurrence of a majority of the 9 members to which the board is entitled shall be necessary for 10 any action taken by the board to be valid. The board shall 11 conduct its meetings to delegate powers and duties to its 12 executive director, or other designee, in accordance with chapters 91 and 92." 13 14 SECTION 3. Section 302A-804, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended as follows: 15 16 1. By amending subsection (b) to read: "(b) The department's powers and duties under this subpart 17 shall be limited to: 18 19 Hiring, except in emergency situations as described in (1)20 this chapter, licensed teachers to teach in their 21 fields of licensing;

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1 (2)Reporting data annually to the board about the supply of, and demand for, teachers in department schools, 2 including the identification of shortage areas, out-3 of-field teaching assignments, number of classrooms 4 5 without a licensed teacher for a guarter or more, 6 numbers of teachers teaching out-of-field, numbers and 7 types of courses and classes taught by out-of-field 8 teachers, and numbers and types of students taught by out-of-field teachers: 9 10 (3) On an emergency and case-by-case basis, hiring unlicensed individuals; provided that: 11 (A) A list of the names, work sites, teaching 12 13 assignments, and progress toward licensing of 14 these individuals shall be reported to the board 15 and any changes shall be updated on a monthly basis by the department; 16 There are no properly licensed teachers for the 17 (B) 18 specific assignments for which the individuals 19 are being hired; and 20 (C) No individual may be employed by the department 21 on an emergency basis for more than three

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1		years $[-]$; provided that in the case of a
2		declaration of a state of emergency pursuant to
3		section 127A-14, the board, pursuant to its
4		powers in section 302A-803(a)(18), may extend the
5		three-year period by authorizing an extension to
6		complete licensing requirements. During this
7		time, the individual shall demonstrate active
8		pursuit of licensing in each year of employment;
9	(4) Subm	itting an annual report to the board documenting:
10	(A)	The number of emergency hires in department
11		schools by subject matter areas and by school;
12	(B)	The reasons and duration of employment for the
13		emergency hiring enumerated in subparagraph (A);

15	(C)	The department's efforts to address the shortages
16		described in subparagraph (A); and

15		that	is pertinent to the charter school's powers and
16		duti	es."

19	SECT	ION 5	. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
