# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EARLY LEARNING.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the demand for 2 quality early care and education far exceeds the amount of 3 available and qualified early childhood educators. Given the 4 critical need to expand access to and the availability of 5 high-quality early care and education programs for the benefit 6 of the State's children and their families, which will 7 ultimately benefit the entire society, particularly now as the 8 State focuses on taking steps toward economic recovery from the 9 unprecedented strain of COVID-19, the legislature recognizes 10 that there must also be enough qualified educators to staff the 11 programs. Furthermore, the legislature recognizes that these 12 educators must have the research-based knowledge and 13 competencies to work with young children and their families. 14 Researchers have repeatedly demonstrated that children, 15 particularly those who come from disadvantaged backgrounds, will 16 benefit from early childhood education; however, it is 17 emphasized that the education must be of high quality.

1 The legislature also finds that preschool teachers are 2 amongst the lowest paid occupations, earning less than parking 3 lot attendants. Moreover, it is difficult to attract 4 individuals to this highly specialized field with such low pay 5 and the misperception that preschool teachers are babysitters. There are many professionals currently working in the early 6 7 childhood field who aspire to work in higher paying positions 8 and could benefit from obtaining the necessary credentials. A 9 stipend program will support workforce development and those 10 individuals seeking to become high-quality early childhood 11 educators, thereby moving the State toward reaching its goal of 12 increasing access to high-quality early learning programs. 13 Acknowledging the importance of obtaining credentials or 14 coursework in early childhood education, the stipend program 15 aligns with national policy initiatives, which recognize that 16 workforce development is key to creating the kind of early 17 childhood systems that make a significant and impactful 18 difference for families and children by financing and bolstering 19 programs that help offset the cost of tuition and encourage

1 early childhood professionals and allowed for preschool 2 development grant funds to be utilized for stipend and 3 scholarship programs. There currently exists private sector 4 funding for the establishment of the stipend program. Without 5 qualified teaching staff, providers across the system will be 6 unable to expand the inventory of early care and education 7 opportunities. Where providers do develop programs, they run 8 the risk of implementing programs that may be detrimental to 9 children, many of whom are living in poverty and who have 10 experienced trauma, and possibly excluding children through 11 suspension and expulsion practices.

12 The purpose of this Act is to make stipends available 13 through an early childhood educator stipend program, to be 14 administered by the executive office on early learning, to 15 encourage individuals, especially those already working in the 16 early childhood field, to pursue a certificate, degree, or 17 license in early childhood education and fill the critical need 18 for qualified educators across the early learning system in 19 programs delivered in either of Hawaii's two official languages. 20 Recognizing early care and education as a specialized field, 21 this program shall be based on the strong foundations laid by

5	SECTION 2. Chapter 302L, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated

9	(a) There is established the Hawaii early childhood educator
10	stipend program to be administered by the office to address the
11	shortage of early childhood educators who have coursework in

13	(b) An individual shall be eligible for stipend
14	consideration if the individual:
15	(1) Is enrolled at a University of Hawaii campus or in a
16	University of Hawaii program and qualifies for Hawaii

18	(2) Is enrolled in a certificate, degree, or license

20	in the Hawaiian language medium, which includes

1	courses required for the respective program of study,
2	within the University of Hawaii system.
3	(c) Immediately following completion of a certificate,
4	degree, or license program pursuant to subsection (b), stipend
5	recipients shall provide early care and education services
6	directly to children from birth through five years of age for at
7	least two consecutive years in one of the early learning systems
8	described in section 302L-2, including Hawaiian language medium
9	and Hawaiian immersion settings and early learning settings at
10	charter schools.
11	(d) If the recipient fails to complete a certificate,
12	degree, or license program pursuant to subsection (b), or to
13	satisfy the work requirements of subsection (c), stipend funds
14	shall be repaid as follows:
15	(1) For each year less than the designated number of years
16	that a stipend recipient does not meet the work
17	requirements of subsection (c), the recipient shall
18	repay a proportionate percentage of the total stipend
19	funds received; and
20	(2) The repayment shall be subject to the terms and
21	conditions set by the office for stipend repayment,

2	eligible for deferment or forgiveness due to hardship
3	or inability to secure employment, as well as
4	potential for fees for the collection of delinquent

6	Stipend funds repaid by a stipend recipient pursuant to this
7	subsection shall be deposited into early learning special fund
8	established pursuant to section 302L-5.
9	(e) In accordance with chapter 103D, the office may enter
10	into written contracts with collection agencies to collect
11	delinquent repayment of stipends owed to the office pursuant to
12	subsection (d). A collection agency that enters into a written
13	contract with the office to collect delinquent stipend
14	repayments pursuant to this section may collect a fee from the
15	debtor in accordance with the terms of, and up to the amounts
16	authorized in, the written contract.
17	(f) The office may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to
18	implement and administer the stipend program, including the
19	terms of repayment pursuant to subsection (d)."
20	SECTION 3. Section 302L-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
