#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH CARE PRECEPTORS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a shortage 2 of primary care providers in the State, which will be 3 exacerbated by the projected retirements of current physicians, 4 advanced practice registered nurses, and pharmacists. Training 5 for primary care requires precepting experiences with both 6 primary care providers and specialist providers. Although 7 students from Hawaii are interested in pursuing careers in the 8 health care service industry in Hawaii, in-state educational 9 institutions are constrained by the lack of clinical education sites in Hawaii and limited supply of qualified preceptors. One 10 11 way to encourage the participation of preceptors is to offer an income tax credit for health care professionals who serve as 12 13 preceptors.

14 The purpose of the existing health care preceptor income 15 tax credit established under section 235-110.25, Hawaii Revised 16 Statutes, is to incentivize volunteer preceptors to offer 17 professional instruction, training, and supervision to students



1 and residents seeking careers as health care providers. During 2 the first-year implementation of the tax credit, a large number 3 of providers trained eligible students in 2019, but only a small 4 subset met the eligibility requirements due to the primary care 5 qualifying criteria.

6 The legislature further finds that training physicians, 7 advanced practice registered nurses, and pharmacists in primary care requires training from specialties that support primary 8 9 care, in addition to training from primary care providers. The 10 legislature also finds that the compensation limits for a 11 preceptor providing a volunteer-based supervised clinical training rotation should be clarified to facilitate the 12 13 preceptor credit assurance committee's implementation of the tax 14 credit.

15 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to:

16 (1) Clarify the limits of when a preceptor may be
17 compensated for the provision of standard clinical
18 services while providing a volunteer-based supervised
19 clinical training rotation;



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Amend the definition of "preceptor" to include 1 (2) 2 specialty providers who support the development and 3 training of students in primary care; and 4 (3) Amend the membership of the preceptor credit assurance 5 committee to include the director of health. 6 SECTION 2. Section 235-110.25, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 amended as follows: 8 1. By amending its title and subsections (a) and (b) to 9 read: 10 "[<del>[</del>]§235-110.25[<del>] Healthcare</del>] Health care preceptor tax 11 credit. (a) There shall be allowed to each taxpayer subject to the tax imposed by this chapter, a [healthcare] health care 12 preceptor tax credit that shall be deductible from the 13 14 taxpayer's net income tax liability, if any, imposed by this 15 chapter for the taxable year in which the credit is properly 16 claimed. 17 (b) The amount of the credit shall be equal to \$1,000 for each volunteer-based supervised clinical training rotation 18 19 supervised by the taxpayer, up to a maximum of \$5,000 per 20 taxable year, regardless of the number of volunteer-based 21 supervised clinical training rotations supervised by the



1	taxpayer. A taxpayer who is a preceptor may be compensated for
2	providing standard clinical services; provided that the taxpayer
3	shall be uncompensated for the volunteer-based supervised
4	clinical training rotation:
5	(1) Above or beyond clinical salary or reimbursements for
6	clinical services; or
7	(2) From tuition funds or state general funds."
8	2. By amending subsection (g) to read:
9	"(g) For the purposes of this section:
10	"Academic program" means an academic degree granting
11	program or graduate medical education program that:
12	(1) Holds either its principal accreditation or a physical
13	location in Hawaii; and
14	(2) Provides education to students, of whom more than
15	fifty per cent are residents of Hawaii.
16	"Advanced practice registered nurse student" means an
17	individual participating in a nationally accredited academic
18	program that is for the education of advanced practice
19	registered nurses and recognized by the state board of nursing
20	pursuant to chapter 457.



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"Eligible professional degree or training certificate"
means a degree or certificate that fulfills a requirement to be
a physician or osteopathic physician, pursuant to chapter 453,
an advanced practice registered nurse, pursuant to chapter 457,
or a pharmacist, pursuant to chapter 461.

6 "Eligible student" means an advanced practice registered
7 nurse student, medical student, or pharmacy student who is
8 enrolled in an academic program.

"Medical student" means an individual participating in a 9 10 nationally accredited academic program leading to the medical 11 doctor or doctor of osteopathy degree. "Medical student" 12 includes graduates from nationally accredited academic programs 13 who have continued their training, in the role of resident or 14 fellow, to obtain the additional qualifications needed for medical licensure, pursuant to chapter 453, or specialty 15 16 certification.

17 "Nationally accredited" means holding an institutional
18 accreditation by name to offer post-secondary medical primary
19 care education. Accreditation for medical students shall be
20 offered by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education or
21 American Osteopathic Association Commission on Osteopathic



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College Accreditation. Accreditation for advanced practice
 registered nurse students shall be offered by the Commission on
 Collegiate Nursing Education.

4 "Pharmacy student" means an individual participating in an
5 academic program that is nationally accredited for the training
6 of individuals to become registered pharmacists pursuant to
7 chapter 461.

8 "Preceptor" means a physician or osteopathic physician [7] 9 licensed pursuant to chapter 453, an advanced practice 10 registered nurse  $[\tau]$  licensed pursuant to chapter 457, or a 11 pharmacist  $[\tau]$  licensed pursuant to chapter 461, who is a 12 resident of Hawaii [and who], maintains a professional [primary 13 care] practice in this State[-], and whose specialty supports 14 the development and training of an eligible student in primary 15 care.

"Primary care" means the principal point of continuing care for patients provided by a [healthcare] health care provider, including health promotion, disease prevention, health maintenance, counseling, patient education, diagnosis and treatment of acute and chronic illnesses, and coordination of other specialist care that the patient may need.



1	"Volunteer-based supervised clinical training rotation"
2	means [ <del>an uncompensated</del> ] <u>a</u> period of supervised clinical
3	training $[of]$ to an eligible student that totals at least eighty
4	hours of supervisory time annually, in which a preceptor
5	provides personalized instruction, training, and supervision to
6	an eligible student to enable the eligible student to obtain an
7	eligible professional degree or training certificate."
8	SECTION 3. Section 321-2.7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended as follows:
10	1. By amending subsections (a) and (b) to read:
11	"(a) There is established the preceptor credit assurance
12	committee within the department of health. The committee shall
13	develop and implement a plan for certifying [ <del>healthcare</del> ] <u>health</u>
14	care preceptor tax credits under section 235-110.25, including:
15	(1) Developing a process ensuring that requests for credit
16	certification are reviewed and verifications are
17	processed no later than thirty days following the
18	close of each calendar year; and
19	(2) Developing the documentation process for the committee
20	to certify a preceptor for the tax credit; provided
21	that the documentation to be collected shall include:



1	(A) The preceptor's name, address, place of practice,
2	and Hawaii provider license number;
3	(B) Dates and hours of volunteer-based supervised
4	clinical training rotation per eligible student;
5	(C) Attestation that the preceptor is uncompensated
6	for the volunteer-based supervised clinical
7	training rotation[ <del>; and</del> ]:
8	(i) Above or beyond clinical salary or
9	reimbursements for clinical services; or
10	(ii) From tuition funds or state general funds;
11	(D) Itemized specialties that support the development
12	and training of the eligible student in primary
13	care; and
14	$\left[\frac{(D)}{(E)}\right]$ (E) Other information deemed necessary by the
15	committee.
16	(b) The committee shall be composed of [ <del>representatives</del>
17	<del>of</del> ]:
18	(1) The director of health or the director's designee; and
19	(2) Representatives of:
20	$\left[\frac{(1)}{(A)}\right]$ The Hawaii/Pacific basin area health education
21	center;



1	[ <del>(2)</del> ] <u>(B)</u> The center for nursing; and
2	[ <del>(3)</del> ] <u>(C)</u> Academic programs with eligible students."
3	2. By amending subsection (e) to read:
4	"(e) As used in this section, "academic program",
5	"eligible student", "preceptor", "primary care", and "volunteer-
6	based supervised clinical training rotation" shall have the same
7	meanings as in section 235-110.25."
8	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
9	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
10	SECTION 5. This Act, upon its approval, shall apply to
11	taxable years beginning after December 31, 2022.
