

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO CONTRACT WITH A QUALIFIED NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION TO ESTABLISH AQUATIC SAFETY EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN CERTAIN DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION SCHOOLS.

WHEREAS, drowning is a tragic but preventable cause of 1 injury and death in the State, especially among children; and 2 3 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Health, drowning 4 was the leading cause of injury-related mortality for Hawaii's 5 children between 2014 and 2018; and 6 7 WHEREAS, more children died by drowning than in motor 8 vehicle and pedestrian accidents combined, and an alarmingly 9 large proportion of those child drownings were among resident 10 children; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, during the same period, there were an annual average of seventy non-fatal child drowning incidents attended 14 by emergency medical services; and 15 16 WHEREAS, although individuals who experience non-fatal 17 drowning incidents escape with their lives, some are left with 18 severe brain damage and may face long-term disabilities such as 19 memory problems, learning disabilities, or permanent losses of 20 basic functions, a disorder often referred to as a persistent 21 vegetative state; and 22 23 WHEREAS, many drowning deaths could be prevented through 24 aquatic safety education programs; and 25 26 WHEREAS, the International Life Saving Federation's 27 Position Statement for Swimming and Safety Education recommends 28



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that everyone have access to training in water safety, personal 1 survival, and water rescue; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the International Life Saving Federation 4 recommends that this training be available to everyone 5 regardless of ability and background and should commence at the 6 earliest possible age; and 7 8 WHEREAS, despite these recommendations, many of Hawaii's 9 youth do not have the opportunity to receive aquatic safety 10 11 instruction; and 12 WHEREAS, less than ten percent of public and public charter 13 elementary schools integrate aquatic safety education into their 14 physical education curricula; and 15 16 WHEREAS, outside of schools, municipal aquatic safety 17 programs lack the resources to meet public demand, and the cost 18 of obtaining private lessons is often cost-prohibitive for many 19 20 local families; and 21 WHEREAS, as a result, many children are inadequately 22 prepared for water-related emergencies; and 23 24 WHEREAS, an assessment of Hawaii students conducted by the 25 Hawaii Aquatics Academy during the 2018-2019 school year found 26 that only thirty-one percent of participating students could 27 swim for twenty-five yards, only twelve percent could float for 28 thirty seconds, and only thirteen percent could tread water for 29 sixty seconds; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, all children should be provided equal access to standards-based aquatic safety education programs; and 33 34 WHEREAS, to achieve this, aquatic safety education should 35 be integrated into the health and physical education curricula 36 37 of public schools; and 38 WHEREAS, providing proper training in water safety, 39 personal survival, and water rescue will help to ensure that the 40 State's youth, especially those from low- and moderate-income 41





1 communities, know how to avoid and recover from hazardous aquatic situations; now, therefore, 2 3 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 4 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 5 Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 6 Education is requested to contract with a qualified nonprofit 7 organization to establish aquatic safety education programs in 8 schools that wish to participate and for which funding is 9 available; and 10 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this aquatic safety education 12 program be offered to elementary school students during regular 13 14 school hours; and 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education is 16 requested to conduct a statewide needs assessment in preparation 17 for establishing an aquatic safety education program in all 18 Department of Education elementary schools to be contracted with 19 one or more qualified nonprofit organizations during regular 20 school hours; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 23 24 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Chairperson of the Board of Education, and Superintendent of 25 Education. 26

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
