A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Section 46-13.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended to read as follows:

3 "[+] §46-13.1[+] Volunteer fire stations. (a) The council 4 of the several counties may establish and maintain one or more 5 volunteer fire stations in any area or areas of the county as it 6 may determine to be necessary to provide adequate fire 7 protection. All necessary facilities and equipment for the 8 volunteer fire stations may be furnished by the county. The 9 officers, firefighters, or other personnel necessary for the 10 operation or maintenance of these stations shall be selected and 11 appointed by the fire chief partially or entirely on a voluntary 12 noncompensatory basis [and], except as otherwise provided in 13 this section. All volunteer personnel for any volunteer fire 14 station shall serve at the pleasure of the fire chief.

(b) The fire chief of the county shall have full authority
and control over all volunteer fire stations, their equipment,
apparatus, officers, firefighters, and personnel, and the fire

chief may designate a suitable person to be in charge of any
 volunteer fire station. Suitable instructors may be assigned
 from time to time by the fire chief to such fire stations for
 the training of volunteer firefighters and personnel.

5 (c) In case any person serving in the capacity of volunteer personnel for the fire station, including a volunteer 6 7 officer or firefighter, sustains any injury or dies as a result 8 of any accident arising out of and in the course of training, or 9 the performance of duty for such fire station, the person shall 10 be entitled to the benefits provided for volunteer personnel in part V of chapter 386, and be considered to be an employee of 11 12 the county for the purpose of obtaining compensation benefits 13 under chapter 386. Compensation benefits shall be determined upon the basis of average weekly wages computed as set forth in 14 15 section 386-51, and upon the basis of earnings from the usual 16 employment of the person, or upon the basis of earnings at the rate of \$18 per week, whichever is most favorable to the 17 : claimant or claimants [-]; provided that for volunteer 18 19 firefighters, average weekly wages shall be computed as set 20 forth in section 386-181(c). 1 industrial relations shall administer the provisions [hereof] in 2 this subsection in accordance with section 386-172. 3 (d) Any provision to the contrary notwithstanding, volunteer personnel, including officers and firefighters, shall 4 5 be entitled to subsistence in amounts deemed proper by the 6 council of the respective counties." 7 SECTION 2. Section 386-181, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: 8 9 "(C) In computing the average weekly wages of an injured public board member, reserve police officer, police chaplain, 10 11 reserve public safety law enforcement officer, sheriffs' chaplain, volunteer firefighter, volunteer boating enforcement 12 officer, or volunteer conservation and resources enforcement 13 14 officer: 15 (1) The person's income from self-employment shall be 16 considered wages; 17 The person shall, in no event, be considered to have (2) earned less than the minimum hourly wage prescribed in 18 19 chapter 387; Wages of other employees in comparable employment 20 (3) 21 [shall not] may be considered; and
