A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DENTISTS AND DENTAL HYGIENISTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's oral health 2 system has been ailing for decades and has struggled to meet the 3 growing needs of its population statewide, especially those with 4 health and social disparities, such as Native Hawaiians, Pacific 5 Islanders, persons with low incomes, persons living in rural 6 communities, and persons with disabilities.

7 The legislature further finds that there are currently more 8 than 288,000 recipients of adult dental benefits across Hawaii. 9 The legislature also finds that statewide emergency department 10 data analyzed from calendar years 2016-2020 shows that 11 significant numbers of Hawaii's adult population who receive 12 medicaid use emergency facilities as their "dental care home", 13 which is an ineffective method of dental care and a misuse of 14 resources.

15 Furthermore, the legislature finds that estimates indicate 16 that the fourteen federally qualified health centers in Hawaii, 17 the State's safety-net care system, served almost forty thousand

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1 patients of all ages (not all of whom receive medicaid 2 assistance) statewide in calendar year 2021 for dental care 3 needs. Dental care in federally qualified health centers for 4 medicaid recipients may be underreported, since the encounters 5 are "uninsured", due to prior emergency-only medicaid coverage.

6 Moreover, the legislature finds that there are a total of three hundred thirty-nine active (defined as filing at least one 7 8 claim in the last six months) medicaid dentists providing dental 9 care for medicaid recipients. This total includes twenty active 10 dentists at federally qualified health centers. Only eleven per 11 cent of Hawaii's dental providers serve one hundred or more 12 persons who receive medicaid assistance, likely due in part to 13 the fact that recipients have had access to emergency-only 14 dental benefits since 2009.

15 The purpose of this Act is to expand access to dental care 16 by:

17 (1) Amending the State's qualifications for community
18 service dentist and dental hygienist licenses by
19 requiring the acceptance of candidates who are
20 graduates of programs recognized by the American
21 Dental Association Commission on Dental Accreditation,

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1 which would increase the pool of eligible dental 2 professional candidates available to work at the department of health, federally qualified health 3 centers, and Native Hawaiian health care systems, 4 5 which also includes post-doctorate dental residency 6 programs for which a temporary license is applicable; 7 (2)Adding "community health center" to the list of 8 eligible organizations at which those with a community 9 service license may practice, thus allowing these 10 providers to better serve Hawaii's medicaid and 11 uninsured populations; and 12 (3) Amending the State's qualifications for dentist 13 temporary licenses by requiring the acceptance of 14 candidates who are graduates of a dental college 15 recognized by the American Dental Association Commission on Dental Accreditation. 16 17 SECTION 2. Section 447-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: "(a) The board of dentistry may issue, without examination, 19 20 a community service license to practice dental hygiene in the 21 employment of a federally qualified health center, Native

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Hawaiian health care system, community health center, or post-1 2 secondary dental auxiliary training program accredited by the American Dental Association Commission on Dental Accreditation. 3 4 Community service licensees under this section shall abide by the requirements and conditions placed upon those fully licensed 5 under this chapter. 6 7 Eligible candidates shall: 8 Provide copies of documentation and credentials that (1)9 include but are not limited to: 10 (A) A diploma or certificate of graduation from a 11 dental hygiene college accredited or recognized 12 by the American Dental Association Commission on 13 Dental Accreditation, recognized and approved by 14 the board; and 15 (B) Either of the following: 16 (i) A certificate or other evidence satisfactory 17 to the board of having passed the 18 examination of the National Board Dental 19 Hygiene Examination, within five years of 20 the date of request; or

Dentists and Dental Hygienists; Licensing; Community Health Centers

Description:

Amends the qualifications for dentist community service licenses and dentist temporary licenses by requiring the acceptance of candidates who are graduates of a dental college recognized by the American Dental Association Commission on Dental Accreditation. Amends the qualifications for dental hygienist community service licenses by requiring acceptance of candidates who are graduates of a dental hygiene college recognized by the American Dental Association Commission on Dental Accreditation. Adds community health centers to the list of eligible organizations that may employ a dental provider with a community service license.
