expenses. No member of the working group shall be subject to
chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of the
member's participation in the working group.

4 (e) Two or more members of the working group, but less 5 than the number of members that would constitute a quorum for 6 the working group, may discuss matters relating to official 7 business of the working group as necessary for the members to 8 faithfully perform the members' duties to the working group and 9 the organizations that the members represent; provided that no commitment to vote shall be made or sought during these 10 discussions. 11

(f) The working group shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2025.

16 (g) The addiction recovery care working group shall be17 dissolved on June 30, 2025.
